This came about from the ironclad ships of the Civil War. It meant something so strong it could not be broken.


CODE OF ETHICS (Earl Winfrey)

When I was at Dyllan's graduation from the Police Academy, I was pleasantly surprised to see the ceremony begin and end with prayer. It's good to see at least one government agency that has not thrown prayer out! I heard an inspiring message about caring for the community and maintaining a balanced life, and I saw plenty of family members as the relatives who were already serving took their place on the stage to help with the passing out of certificates.

As I was reading the program for the ceremony, something caught my eye. On the back, they had a "Law Enforcement Code of Ethics" which was a 4 paragraph statement of what a Law Enforcement Officer believes to be the correct way to live. As I was reading it, I kept thinking that this code of ethics would work great for Ministers too. I was going to share this with the word Minister inserted, but I started thinking about how fathers are the ministers for the family. They are also law enforcement officers for the children so I decided to place the word father in the statement to show how this applies. Here it is:

As a Father, my fundamental duty is to serve my family; to safeguard their lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation, and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the God given rights of the family to liberty, equality, and justice.

I will keep my life unsullied as an example to all; maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn, or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed in both my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the laws of the land and the regulations of the Bible. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.



I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, animosities, or favoritism to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence.

I recognize the title of Father as a symbol of who I am and I accept it as a blessing that has been granted by God. I will remain true to the ethics of God's family. I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession, Fatherhood.

Glimpses of God, part 2 ~ Sara Lantzer

Once upon a time, God was in the process of creating humans. He had already finished a great, big world for them to inhabit and take care of. All He had left to do was to make them according to the beautiful, proven pattern of Himself.

They would show to all creation, and especially among themselves, little glimpses of what He, the Unseen God, was like. What a privilege He was giving them!

So, as God continued this process of making humans, He set aside a special gift just for the boys. This select group of humans would be able to display very clearly God's nature of protecting.

The word Father is a precious name to wear. Just as God protects what is His own, so too does a dad. Fathers help us glimpse what God is like through good days and bad days, through discipline or duel or deliverance, ... though oftentimes their efforts are belittled or misunderstood or unwanted.

Consider the word Gentleman with me for a moment, as well. It is also a precious name to wear, though not every man or boy can be called one. Just as God gives His protection to humans without arrogance, so too does a gentleman.

He uses his words to build up, not to tear down.

He opens the door for a lady, displaying selflessness in a subtle way.

He tells his daughter not to wear a skimpy dress, even if she won't listen to him.

He works day in and day out in order to pay the mortgage on the family abode, even if he'd rather be fishing or riding a Harley.

So, in an unconscious effort to display a glimpse of God's nature of protecting, a Gentleman is lavish in his kind treatment of others. He fights against wrongs, even at the expense of paying the highest price, pieces or the whole of his very life, in order to provide safety.

Thank You, Lord, for Fathers, for Gentlemen, and most of all, for Yourself.

“The Lord is My Shepherd” (Earl Winfrey - Father’s Day sermon from 2014)

Anybody associated with church or church people should be familiar with Psalm 23. It is probably the most popular and most widely used Psalm today. It is a staple for Sunday School classes because it lays the foundation for an understanding of who God is. It is also popular in funerals because it reminds us that even though we may be in the deepest, darkest part of the valley, God is there with us to help us grieve the loss of a loved one. Psalm 23 can comfort us when we experience the pain of trials too. Whether the trials are self-inflicted or thrust upon us from the outside, God is there to help us stand strong and remain faithful. There are many great uses for Psalm 23, and no matter what stage of life you are in, this Psalm reminds us of how God takes care of us. He is our shepherd; therefore, we should never be afraid to walk with the Lord.

As we move through the sermon, there is a perspective I want to use that might not be as familiar because many people don’t think about this. In light of Father’s Day being today, I would like to look at Psalm 23 through the eyes of a father. Fathers are given many titles when describing their role in the family but there is one title found in this Psalm that can capture the essence of what fatherhood is all about. Fathers need to be good shepherds of the family, and Psalm 23 gives us a full understanding of what that means. David calls God his shepherd. In John 10:1-21, Jesus says that He is the Good Shepherd. Listen to John 10:11-15:

“[11] I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. [12] He who is a hired hand and not a shepherd, who does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and flees, and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. [13] He flees because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep. [14] I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, [15] just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I lay down my life for the sheep.”

In Ephesians, the Apostle Paul says that the husbands are to love their wives the same way Jesus loves the church and gives up his life for the church. Paul is saying that Jesus should be our example of how to lead the household with a sacrificial love. And since Jesus leads by being the good shepherd, and He is our example of leading with a sacrificial love, we should follow Jesus’ example and become good shepherds for our families.

So how should we become shepherds for our families? We can start by being a supplier and the security for our kids. And then we need to introduce them to our Savior so they can follow the path of righteousness laid out for Christians.

I. Supplier (Psalm 23:1-3)

A. 2 items mentioned: Green pastures/still waters - The strange thing about sheep is that because of their very makeup it is almost impossible for them to be made to lie down unless four requirements are met: 1) They must be free from all fear, 2) They must be free from friction with other sheep (Spread out), 3) They must be free from any kind of annoying pests like flies or parasites, and 4) They must be free from hunger and the need to find food.

If you try to get a child to go to sleep, those same 4 requirements need to be met: 1) They must not be scared, 2) They must not be fighting with siblings, 3) They must not be annoyed at something, and 4) They need full stomachs.

The dad can take care of those 4 requirements for the kids, but he needs help since he can’t be around the kids all day and still work a job to provide for the family. This is why God provided a helper for the man and we call her Mom. Working together, mom and dad can make their kids lie down in green pastures so they can relax and recharge for the next day. Let’s talk about the still waters.

When sheep are thirsty they become restless and set out in search of water. If not led to the good water supplies of clean, pure water, they will often end up drinking from the polluted pot holes where they pick up such internal parasites as nematodes, liver flukes, or other disease germs. And in precisely the same manner Christ, our Good Shepherd made it clear that thirsty souls of men and women can only be fully satisfied when their capacity and thirst for spiritual life is fully quenched by drawing on Himself.

As the head of the household, the fathers are the suppliers so the kids can have a roof over their heads and a bed to lie down in. They also have food to eat so they can stay healthy and grow. As the spiritual leader of the house, the fathers are the suppliers of the living water that comes from Jesus. When the time is right, the kids should be taught the Bible so their spiritual thirsts can be quenched. And of course, the father is not alone with this responsibility. God provided moms to help the dads so they can raise children who love the Lord.

B. When the parents are on the same page, and the kids have their physical and spiritual needs taken care of, the next concept can be implemented. David writes that God restores my soul - Now there is an exact parallel to this in caring for sheep. Only those intimately acquainted with sheep and their habits understand the significance of a "cast" sheep or a "cast down" sheep. This is an old English shepherd's term for a sheep that has turned over on its back and cannot get up again by itself. A cast sheep is a pathetic sight. Lying on its back, its feet in the air, it flays away frantically struggling to stand up, without success. When the shepherd rescues the sheep and sets it upright, the sheep is restored and no longer panics.

Even when we care for our kids' physical and spiritual needs, there will be times when they may end up cast. Life has a way of knocking you off your feet and that is when you need help getting back up. Our kids need to know that whatever happens, they can count on us to help them recover from being cast down. We can restore their souls by helping them through the trials they experience.

God did this with the people of Israel many times throughout the Old Testament.

In Jeremiah 31:1-14, we see God promising to reunite the Israelites after the Babylonian captivity ended. This is important to understand because as parents, we need to restore our children after they suffer a punishment. The Jews cast themselves down when they chased after idols instead of being faithful to God. As a result, God allowed them to be captured in order to teach them a lesson. But when the punishment ended, God restored His people so they became a nation again. The Jews sinned, God punished them, and then He restored them.

C. When kids slip up and cast themselves down, we punish them, but then we need to restore them so we can continue to lead them in paths of righteousness. - This restoration is not wiping out the crime as if it never happened. It is repairing the damage that was caused so the relationship can continue to be healthy. One of the most important jobs of the shepherd is to keep the sheep moving from field to field to field so they don't destroy their environment and end up sick with disease. If they stay in 1 field too long, they will run out of grass, and the poor condition of the field would be the perfect setting for pests and disease to infect the flock. The sheep do not know when to move so if the shepherd is not leading them, they will continue to destroy their environment until there is nothing left.

A family without a father is something that society is trying to say is normal. Single moms are becoming common, but that does not mean this kind of situation is a good thing. Can a family survive without a father? On the surface, they can. But through time, the family will break down because the kids need both mom and dad to keep them healthy. A family with both mom and dad will flourish and produce kids who will grow up to build healthy families. And with the new generation of healthy families come the hope of turning this world around for good.

But it has to start with Dad being the shepherd for the kids. (Continued on the next page...)

II. Security (Psalm 23:4-5)

A. The Valley - Notice that the valley in verse 4 comes before dwelling in the house of the Lord mentioned in verse 6. We have to experience the valley before we can enjoy the blessing. We cannot enjoy the mountain tops without first experiencing the valleys. This valley is described as containing the shadow of death which gives the picture of a dark and scary place where the sun is hidden because of how deep the path has become. It's during those low points of the valley that faith in God is the only way to survive because you can no longer see your way out. At that point, God chooses to use either the rod or the staff to bring you out.

B. The Rod - The shepherd's rod asserts authority and power when used to correct the sheep's path. It also protects the sheep from predators as it is a defensive weapon. And during times of inspection, the rod is used to lift the wool of the sheep in order to uncover blemishes that may have formed. The rod for us is the Bible. The Bible is our authority and power used to correct our paths. The Bible can protect us from the enemy when trials come our way. It can also be used as a mirror so we can examine our souls and uncover any blemishes that may have formed in our lives.

As parents, we use a rod that produces the same result when it is formed using God's Word. The rod of discipline is not just about punishing the kids when they are bad. It is also about correcting their path by pointing them in the right direction. If all we ever do is wait for them to make mistakes, we are not going to be very effective with raising our kids. We have to build them up and prepare them for the journey of life. That's what God does with us through the Bible, and this is what we can do for our kids by using that same Bible.

C. The Staff is another description of the Bible - The shepherd's staff is custom made for the shepherd. It provides comfort for the shepherd and the sheep as it can be used to pull the sheep out of danger. Sometimes, the sheep would wander into the nearby bushes and get caught in the thorns. The shepherd's staff is a great tool for pulling the sheep out of the bushes without causing additional damage to either the sheep or the shepherd. In the same way, the Bible can help us pull our kids out of the thorny bushes known as sin so they can be restored. And when they are restored, the family is back on track for God.

III. Savior (Psalm 23:6)

A. Goodness and mercy - In Isaiah 40:1-5, God speaks through His prophet to send a message to His people. God promises that once the punishment is over, they will be comforted because the Messiah is coming to save them. Looking back, we can see that the Messiah is Jesus. During the time Isaiah spoke these words, the Jews were most likely confused about the message. All they know is that their world has been shaken, and they need a savior. God promises to be their savior and He will show them goodness and mercy when the time for salvation arrives. Obviously, we are not saviors for our kids in that sense. However, we are responsible for introducing them to our savior so they can have a saving relationship with Jesus. As shepherds of the family, we should guide them to Jesus so they can begin the most important journey in their lives.

B. Goodness and mercy follow us all the days of our lives - This is an indication that a daily walk is required, not a 1 time event. A shepherd-sheep relationship requires a daily walk so they can build trust and the sheep will know who to follow. A true father-child relationship relies on a daily walk so they can journey through life together with God as their guide. This takes time to build, but the benefits are definitely worth the investment. There is a special bond between a father and his kids that cannot be replaced by anything else in the world. This special bond is different than the bond between a mother and her children because it was designed that way. And this is why both parents are needed to raise kids in a way that pleases God. Moms and Dads can create well rounded children who love the Lord as long as they are both on the same page with the same goal in mind. (To be concluded on the next page)

C. And that goal is for our kids to dwell forever in God's house - The greatest gift we can give our children is the gift of salvation! My dad taught me many things while I was growing up, but the greatest lesson my dad taught me was that my relationship with God is top priority. And he taught me that by being the driver of the car. I mean that both physically and spiritually. He drove us to church and he was actively involved in church. I learned that the church was my supply for green pastures and still waters so my soul could be restored and my thirst could be quenched. I learned that church was where I could learn about the paths of righteousness I needed to follow.

My security came from the church because I knew that no matter what kind of trials were hidden in the valley, the Lord was with me as He worked through His people to comfort and guide me using a rod or a staff depending on what the situation called for. My dad was my shepherd who kept me in God's flock known as the church so I could grow up and become a shepherd for my kids too.

As I look out and see our beautiful families in this church, I can tell that we have some great dads who understand what it takes to be shepherds for their families. And from one dad to another, let me just say thank you because when we are working together to grow our families in the Lord, our kids will be that much stronger when it is their turn to become shepherds for their own families.

Barnabas (Acts 4:36-37; 9:26-27)

Barnabas was a great associate for the early church leaders. He was always willing to introduce new workers and help train them to be useful for Kingdom. Beginning with his name, Son of Encouragement, he has always been the kind of person who would encourage others. Once in a leadership role, he continued to be an encourager as he had done many good things for the church. Although the accounts of Barnabas involve his role as a leader for the church, we can learn from his example and lead our families in the same way.

Barnabas is not a well known character in the Bible mainly because of the Apostle Paul becoming the leader of the group, but we do have enough information to see how Barnabas was a good mentor, mediator and model for those who were in his circle of influence.

I. The Mentor

- A. Levite from Cyprus (Acts 4:36)
- B. Cousin John Mark (Mother hosted prayer meeting while Peter was in prison – Acts 12:12)
- C. God prepared Barnabas for mentoring (We have been prepared too!)

II. The Mediator

- A. Brought Paul to the Apostles (Acts 9:26-27)
- B. Restored John Mark and Paul
 - 1. Acts 15:2 – Disagreement
 - 2. 1 Corinthians 9:6 – Paul and Barnabas work together
 - 3. Colossians 4:10 – Paul and John Mark work together
 - 4. 2 Timothy 4:11 – Paul requested John Mark to join him because he was “Useful for me in my ministry” (Complete restoration took place)


III. The Model

- A. Good man full of the Holy Spirit (Acts 11:24)
- B. Opened the door for Paul at Antioch
- C. Faded into the background (Acts 13:4-12)
(Barnabas and Paul became Paul and Barnabas)






