## What Kind of Church is First Christian Church?

First Christian Church is a non-denominational Elders-led Church located in Greenwood, SC. We are part of the movement to restore the simplicity of New Testament Christianity. We believe that Jesus Christ is the son of God, that He lived a sinless life, offered His life for ours on the Cross, and rose on the third day to live forever. We believe that salvation comes through simple obedience to the plan of salvation that is laid out in the pages of the New Testament.



### Core Beliefs

# Biblical Foundation

It was my 8th grade year. We began the football season with a new head coach, and we were excited about his vision for us. We were ready to win. We went through the August practice, and just like the other teams, we were ready for our first game of the season. We ran onto the field, played our hearts out, and lost to a team that was far more superior.

The rest of the season happened the same way. Every week, we ran onto the field with confidence and went home with our tail between our legs because once again, we played a team that was on a different level than us. We got discouraged, frustrated, and angry.

Each week, our practices became more intense. The coach would create more plays for us to run and we would practice harder because we wanted to show the other teams that we were not the last place team that our record said we were. We focused on winning, but the wins never came. We prayed for God to help us find where we needed to improve, and we seemed to be getting worse. We fought hard, but we could never get over the fact that our team was that bad. After finishing the season without a win, the coach got fired, I switched schools and found a coach who was the exact opposite of my previous coach.

Coach Thorn was a legend, and I have talked about him often. I arrived at the first practice, and noticed that we were not running any plays. For the first couple of weeks, all we did was run through drills and conditioning. We worked on the basic fundamentals of the game without putting on pads and we didn't line up for scrimmage until the coach felt that we were ready. Even when we ran plays, we only worked on them after our drills which took up most of the practice. The coach didn't talk about winning or losing. He didn't dump a huge playbook in our laps. And he rarely talked about who we were playing until it was time to work on our strategy. He did this because he knew that before we could worry about the game, we had to learn how to play. We had to develop the skills necessary to help us win. At the end of the year, we won more games than we lost so I am sure we can say that his philosophy worked.

The problem with the first team was that we focused so much on the game that we forgot how to play. We never took the time to develop ourselves, and that showed up on the field. If we would have taken a few steps back and worked on the basic fundamentals of the game, we may have won at some point during that season.

As we prepare for leadership, I want us to focus on developing ourselves before trying to take on being a leader in the church. That will be the best way for us to "Win" at leading, so we will be working on the basic fundamentals of leadership before we jump into the specifics of church leadership. I hope you will join me right here next month as we begin our journey together!

## The Hummingbird and The New Coffee Mug (Michael Winfrey)

*Be still, and know that I am God.” Psalm 46:10*

I love hummingbirds! I think that they are one of God’s neatest creations. For Mother’s Day, Earl got me a hummingbird feeder and placed it at the back of the house so that I can see the birds as I am sitting in the living room. It did not take too long for the hummingbirds to show up and start feasting away. I will sit in my chair and talk to them, believing that they can hear me through the window. I will tell them to eat up and I occasionally try to break up a dispute over rights to the feeder!

I am a lover of coffee (for about five years now)! I am married to a man that loves coffee. Several years ago I noticed a sad trend in the Winfrey household. My husband would ask if I want a cup of coffee. I would say no. He wanted a cup of coffee but did not want to be wasteful so he just wouldn't make a pot. After several of those interactions, I began hearing in my spirit, “Share a cup of coffee with your husband.” So I began drinking coffee, not because I like it but because I love my husband.

I love teaching! I currently teach the K4 class and I absolutely adore my class! Several weeks ago was Teacher Appreciation Week and I was showered with lovely gifts. One of the gifts I received was a coffee mug with the words “Be Still” written on both sides. I told my student that this is one of my favorite verses and that I can’t wait to drink a cup of coffee from my new mug.

This past Saturday, while Earl was away and the kids were playing, I sat down in my chair with my “Be Still” mug full of coffee. As I took the first sip I noticed, out of the corner of my eye, one of my daily visitors partaking in a delicious breakfast of sugar water! I looked at the bird...I looked at the mug...then back at the bird...then back at my mug. It hit me! I began doing a little research.

The hummingbird, on average, flaps it’s wings 3,180 times per minute. The human heart beats, on average, 60-100 per minute. **WE WERE NEVER CREATED TO BE HUMMINGBIRDS!!!!** We are always on the go. We get up at the crack of dawn and fill our schedules with activity after activity. Those activities only multiply if we add children to the mix. We pick them up from school to race them to some sort of practice. That practice is over and we fly through the drive-thru, barely slowing down to grab our order. We scarf that food down so we won’t be late to the next practice. We pull into the driveway just in time for the children to grab a 30 second shower before dragging themselves to bed. Somewhere in there...who knows where...they try to finish their homework. We do this on an almost daily basis and call it living life.

God calls us to be still. He wants us to STOP! Look at Psalm 46:10. Notice that comma? A comma indicates a pause. The thought is stopped for a brief moment. When we pause we know who God is. Remember how He came to Elijah? Was it in the great, strong wind that tore the mountains and broke the rocks? No. Was it in the earthquake? No. Was it in the fire? No. Was it in the low whisper? YES! We cannot hear God in the winds of distractions. We cannot get clarification while in the earthquake of chaos that often move us from one space to another. We cannot be certain of what His will is while we are in the fire of anxiety that engulfs our every moment. It is only when we “BE STILL” that we can hear Him. We can begin to make out His voice over the distractions. Things become clear because we have stopped moving. His will becomes evident because our moments belong to Him.

PRACTICE being still. PRACTICE listening for that low whisper. If need be, get a hummingbird feeder and a new coffee mug!

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I know that we are not where we want to be as a church, but thank God that we have come a long way from where we were! And we continue to move in the right direction as this year, we have seen several visitors for our Morning Worship service. We have received visitors at least once every month and I have a feeling that we will continue seeing this happen for the rest of the year. And while we are still waiting for some of the visitors to "Stick" with us, I know that this is positive movement for our church.

Another great improvement is our face in the community. Thanks to our ad that runs on the TV Guide channel, our Facebook page and website, our participation in community events and our church events for the community, we are getting recognized by people who did not know we were here. I used to have conversations that involved a comment about how people didn't know we were still a church but now, I am able to talk about how we are doing some great things and people are beginning to get interested in knowing more.

3 years have gone by quickly, and we are still working at improving some areas, but I think we can smile at what we have done so far with the Lord's help, and as long as the creek don't rise, we will continue working to be that church that God can be proud of.

For our newsletter, you will see the new sections that I talked about last month, and those articles will be a consistent presence for us. We also have a new writer for us, and I am excited about her contribution!



## Wilderness Period: Deuteronomy



### Getting Acquainted

- Aim: Deuteronomy forms a fitting conclusion to the ministry of Moses

- Theme: Obedience is essential!

- The fifth of the "Five scrolls" was named in the Greek Old Testament, Deuteronomion, "Second law." The name is derived from the fact that Moses repeated and at times adjusted the Law just before his death. Some Rabbis called Deuteronomy "The Book of Exhortations," but most referred to it by the first key word debharim, "Words."

- The importance of Deuteronomy can be seen in the frequency with which it was quoted in the Dead Sea Scrolls and in the New Testament. When he was tempted, Jesus responded to the Devil in each instance with a quotation from Deuteronomy (Matthew 4:4, 7, 10). When he was asked which was the first and greatest commandment (Matthew 22:37), He cited Deuteronomy 6:5. He referred to specific points of the Law as formulated in Deuteronomy on several occasions (Matthew 18:16, 19:8, 22:24).

### The Authorship of Deuteronomy

- The claims of the Book:

- + Presents itself as being the record of discourses spoken by Moses
- + Deuteronomy 31:9 states that Moses was the author

- Claims of the Critics:


- + This book was a forgery
  - = Created just before the reformation of King Josiah
  - = Written over 700 years after the death of Moses
  - = Priests pretended to discover the book in the temple (621BC)
- + Conservative scholars answer
  - = Many references from other books credit Moses as the author
  - = Chapter 34 may have been added since it talks about his death
  - = No reason to deny Mosaic authorship since Jesus believed it

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## Setting of Deuteronomy

- About 70 days separate Moses' first address (1:3) from Joshua 4:19
- No new characters are introduced in this book
- Geographical setting for the book:
  - + Plains of Moab across the Jordan from Jericho
  - + Israel was camped in the valley near Beth Peor (3:29, 4:46)
- Moses reviews the entire history of Israel beginning in Egypt
- The Book of Numbers ends at the border of the Promised Land
- Moses prepared them to enter the land using Deuteronomy:
  - + A new generation made it necessary to review the history
  - + The new land was filled with gross religious corruption
  - + New dangers were waiting for them in the Promised Land
  - + They were going to settle in the new land forever
  - + New military, economic, and spiritual challenges were present
  - + Transition to agricultural life meant new assignments to be given
  - + A new leader was emerging as Moses faded away



## The Structure of Deuteronomy

- The First Address (Deuteronomy 1-4): Review of Israel's history
- The Second Address (Deuteronomy 5-26)
  - + Moses explains the statutes and ordinances in chapter 5
  - + (6-11) Moses stressed the need for humility and avoiding idolatry
  - + (12-26) Legal material revised to apply to new situation in Canaan
- The Third and Fourth Addresses (Deuteronomy 27-30)
  - + Provision for covenant renewal in the Promised Land
  - + Call for renewal of commitment, last exhortation to obey the Lord
- Appendix (Deuteronomy 31-34): Final preparations and death of Moses

## REFLECTIONS ON THE RESTORATION

The car in the picture is a 1950 Mercury. As you can see, there was not much hope for the car as plants were growing in it, but the finished product looks as good as new. After the owner put his mind to it, the car became showroom ready. I'm sure it was discouraging when he started, but he soon found out that it can be done. The 1950 Mercury was a popular car for movies. If you watched Rebel without a cause or the musical Grease, you would recognize this model. In Grease, I believe this model was driven by a character named Crater-Face.

A complete restoration like this one is not easy. In fact, this is one of the hardest projects you can take on as far as cars are concerned because you have to go from bumper to bumper fixing everything along the way. I remember helping my dad with a 1964 Pontiac Catalina Convertible and he helped me with a 1978 Triumph Spitfire convertible, and with each vehicle we had a different set of issues that grew as we worked. A complete restoration is never truly complete because there is always something to be worked on, but it is a labor of love so it doesn't really matter how long it takes.

This is a good picture of the Restoration Movement as we are trying our best to bring the church back to the Bible. During the first couple of centuries, the church of the New Testament went through some unhealthy transitions that slowly started moving them away from the Apostles' teachings. As the centuries went by, the church moved farther and farther away until faithful men tried to bring the church back to where it needed to be. Now we have several hundreds of years' worth of stories that make up our heritage, and this helps us stay on track while we continue this labor of love known as the complete restoration of God's church. We will never truly be finished because there is so much work that needs to be done, but we are making progress as we are closer to the book of Acts today than before.

Our church is also a restoration project. Through the years, our church has seen good times and years that were not so good. And with every set of trials that we have faced, God has been faithful as He allowed this church to stay open. Even during those dark periods when it felt like there was no other option, God somehow kept us going because He still believes in us. And now it is our turn to show God how thankful we are for this opportunity to restore His church. It is time to move forward as we continue what God has started.

Just like the 1950 Mercury in the picture, there is a lot of work left for us as a church, but it can be done. We may not be as big as the other churches in the area, but God still wants us to reach out and connect with the community. We may not have the resources that other churches may have, but we can still make an impact for Christ. Instead of looking at everything we may not have, God wants us to look at Him and know that **IT CAN BE DONE!**



For our first Church myth, I figured I would start with the obvious one:

“The preacher only works 1 hour per week.”

I would hope that we all know that this is a myth and although we may joke about it, the job of a preacher is never finished. By the way, I am writing this at 2:00am on a Saturday morning, but I digress. All kidding aside, I have seen and heard accusations directed at me and others who have chosen to work for the Lord in the local church, and some of those accusations were not very nice. I remember hearing a story about an elder going into the Minister’s office and he made the comment about how he wanted to make sure the Minister was earning his paycheck. I wonder how that elder would have felt if that Minister went to his work to make sure he was earning his paycheck.

Sometimes I wonder if part of the problem could be the fact that we are not as transparent as we should be when it comes to what we do. I remember being asked an honest question about what I do during the week, and I appreciated the chance to share it. After sharing my week, that person understood that being a preacher is not just about standing in the pulpit for 30 minutes each week and locking up the church before going home.

That being said, it is hard to describe a typical week for a preacher because the weeks are not typical. However, there is a consistent end to each week, and that is the sermon. My process for sermon writing takes a while, because I began writing my sermons when I was old enough to read. Everything I read, study, and teach from the Bible eventually shows up in a sermon or a lesson or a newsletter article. God has been preparing me along the way even when I had no idea that I was going to become a preacher. I also took several years of Bible college to study deeply, and the fruit from that labor shows up too. Each sermon takes a lifetime of research because God uses everything I have experienced to help me write.

Think about it this way. A sermon is like a research paper you write in school. And every week, a new research paper must be written so this takes up the bulk of my time. The rest of my time is used for other church related activities that may or may not be something that can be given to somebody else depending on the job description. Every church is unique so every preacher will have different responsibilities according to the churches they serve. However, one thing is certain. Preachers work more than 1 hour per week, so I would have to emphatically say that this myth is busted!

This is where we get to know each other on a deeper level instead of just staying on the surface. This is where we can move people from the outside into the inner circle of our lives. To help us understand the circles we set up, I am sharing an outline from a sermon:



#### I. Congregation (Mark 3:7-12)

- A. Jesus had many disciples around Him
- B. We have Sunday morning worship
  - 1. Surface level relationships
  - 2. The beginning of Fellowship

If Sunday morning worship is the only type of fellowship you have with other believers, you are robbing yourself of the deep relationships God intended for His children to have!

#### II. Class (Mark 3:13-19)

- A. Jesus had 12 Apostles
- B. We have Sunday School/Wed night Bible Study
  - 1. Deeper relationships and growth
  - 2. Genuine Fellowship is enhanced
- C. How does somebody become part of the 2nd circle?

#### III. Inner Circle (Matthew 17:1-8)

- A. Jesus had His inner circle
- B. Who is in your inner circle?
  - 1. Deepest relationships are built here
  - 2. Is Jesus in your inner circle? (John 15:14-15)
- C. How does somebody become part of your inner circle?




