## What Kind of Church is First Christian Church?

First Christian Church is a non-denominational Elders-led Church located in Greenwood, SC. We are part of the movement to restore the simplicity of New Testament Christianity. We believe that Jesus Christ is the son of God, that He lived a sinless life, offered His life for ours on the Cross, and rose on the third day to live forever. We believe that salvation comes through simple obedience to the plan of salvation that is laid out in the pages of the New Testament.



### Core Beliefs



## STAY IN TOUCH WITH REAL PEOPLE







## REFLECTIONS ON THE RESTORATION

“Barton W. Stone (Part 2)” (Taken from Earl’s Restoration History class for the local church)

### Early Preaching Years:

1. Before the spring 1794 meeting of the Orange Presbytery, Stone became depressed and decided to abandon the idea of preaching. A major source of his depression was the Westminster Confession (1648 – Presbyterian Creed). (Contradictions inside the Confession):
  - A. The Creed declares that God is not the author of sin, but it says that God caused everything to happen, which includes sin, so God caused it.
  - B. The Creed states that God desires salvation of all people, the “revealed” will of God, but that there is a “secret” will of God that some people were condemned.
2. Stone went to a Methodist school in Washington, GA and taught for about a year. (Became a professor of languages and became friends with Methodist and Presbyterian Ministers. He developed an emphasis on the common core of the Gospel and took this time to heal from the depression he was suffering.)
3. Stone eventually went back to preaching, and received his license to preach
4. During the first 3 months, Stone went with Robert Foster on an evangelistic tour through eastern portions of NC and VA, but they had little success. (Stone had intentions of running away to Florida, but an elderly woman in the church accused him of being a Jonah, so he changed his mind and headed west to continue preaching)
5. Stone headed west through Knoxville, TN up into KY and by October 1796, he was installed as the regular supply minister of 2 churches: Cane Ridge and Concord.

### Ordination:

1. Cane Ridge and Concord called Stone to be their settled pastor, and this required ordination.
2. Stone applied for ordination through the Transylvania Presbytery (Confided with 2 ministers that there were doctrinal differences)
3. During ordination, Stone was asked before the congregation if he adhered to the Westminster Confession, and he responded, “I do, as far as I see it consistent with the Word of God.” (Typical response for revival preachers, so they approved the statement)

## ARE WE ENCOURAGING TOURISM OR WORSHIP?

"Modern day American "Christians" approach Christianity and the church like tourists. You will see tourists dressing like the stereotypes of the people of the area they're visiting. They take in some of the popular sites and customs and enjoy the atmosphere, food and music. But then they go back home to their monotonous lives. I think many have the same level of commitment to Christ that tourists have to the places they visit: sing some songs, say a prayer, toss in some spare change as they would into the open guitar case of a struggling musician on the street, say hello to a few people - and then go home and plan out their week with no thought of where they've been and what teaching they've heard. And - who knows? Maybe they'll go visit again in a few weeks to dip their toes in the water. They don't want to go two weeks in a row! That'd be almost fanatical! "Just a little religion goes a long way" (they tell themselves). Jesus calls us not to treat Him like He's a tourist attraction but to take up our crosses daily and follow Him all the way...if we are doing that we will look forward to the weekly gathering of His people to worship and praise Him as we will find encouragement and nourishment to continue this new life.

This is the sad reality of life because we all grow old and with old age come the complications of trying to keep the world from spinning so we can enjoy those special moments one last time before the Lord takes us home.



## Books of Poetry: Ecclesiastes

(Several sources used each month)



### Introduction

The title “Ecclesiastes” comes from a Greek word indicating a person who calls an assembly, so it makes sense that the author identified himself in Ecclesiastes 1:1 by the Hebrew word *qoheleth*, translated as “Preacher.” Despite leaving only this rather mysterious name to indicate his identity, evidence in the book, along with most Jewish and Christian tradition, suggests that King Solomon authored Ecclesiastes.

The Preacher went on to call himself “the son of David, king in Jerusalem,” one who has increased in “wisdom more than all who were over Jerusalem before me,” and one who has collected many proverbs (Ecclesiastes 1:1, 16; 12:9). Solomon followed David on the throne in Jerusalem as the only Davidic son to rule over all Israel from that city (1:12). He was the wisest man in the world during his time (1 Kings 4:29–30) and wrote most of the book of Proverbs (Proverbs 1:1; 10:1; 25:1). Therefore, we can safely identify Solomon as the *qoheleth* of the opening verse.

### Occasion for writing this book

With Solomon as the author of the book, we know it had to have been written sometime before his death in 931 BC. The content of Ecclesiastes reflects someone looking back on a life that was long on experience but short on lasting rewards. As king, he had the opportunity and resources to pursue the rewards of wisdom, pleasure, and work in and of themselves. Yet the world-weary tone of the writing suggests that late in life, he looked back on his folly with regret, pointing us to a better, simpler life lived in light of God’s direction (Ecclesiastes 12:13–14).

### Why is Ecclesiastes so important?

Ecclesiastes presents us a naturalistic vision of life—one that sees life through distinctively human eyes—but ultimately recognizes the rule and reign of God in the world. This more humanistic quality has made the book especially popular among younger audiences today, men and women who have seen more than their fair share of pain and instability in life but who still cling to their hope in God.

### What’s the big idea?

Ecclesiastes, like much of life, represents a journey from one point to another. Solomon articulated his starting point early in the book: “Vanity of vanities! All is vanity” (Ecclesiastes 1:2), indicating the utter futility and meaninglessness of life as he saw it. Nothing made sense to him because he had already tried any number of remedies—pleasure, work, and intellect—to alleviate his sense of feeling lost in the world.

However, even in the writer’s desperate search for meaning and significance in life, God remained present. For instance, we read that God provides food, drink, and work (2:24); both the sinner and the righteous person live in God’s sight (2:26); God’s deeds are eternal (3:14); and God empowers people to enjoy His provision (5:19). The great truth of Ecclesiastes lies in the acknowledgment of God’s ever-present hand on our lives. Even when injustice and uncertainty threaten to overwhelm us, we can trust Him and follow after Him (12:13–14).



**This month's Church myth:** "Embracing the new means you hate what was already there."

Unfortunately, this month's myth can be heart breaking because of the misunderstandings and arguments that happen when the church faces a decision that is not appealing to everyone. If a person proposes a change, there are usually some people who are resisting the change because they want things to stay the way it is. Some of that comes from nostalgia and not wanting to let go of the past but there is also a sense of distrust because they view the person proposing the change as one who hates what is already here.

Jesus dealt with this on numerous occasions because He was introducing a New Covenant in which the Law of Moses would no longer be needed. When it came time to begin the church, the Apostles had to deal with Judaizers who did not like the Gentiles worshipping with them. The church survived because the Apostles were able to navigate the rough waters of change. Today, our churches often spend much time and energy on trying to get people to agree on something that could help them move forward into the future.

Change can be painful and those who want change can get a little too pushy while those who resist change can be too stubborn. However, it is a dangerous activity to accuse those trying to change something of hating what is already there. I will admit that there is a possibility of those people hating what is there but I have a feeling that more often than not, those wanting change still like what is already there, but they recognize that in order to survive, change is needed.

When an okra seed pod is planted in the ground, it grows and produces food for a season. At the end of that season, it will produce new seed pods for the future and then die. If the gardener tries to keep the old plant and refuses to use the seed pods that were produced, there will not be any okra the next season. Sometimes, there are old elements of the church that need to die in order for the new to come in and grow. That does not mean the old was bad. It just means that with every new generation, there are changes that must take place if the church wants to continue.

Obviously, there are some changes that should never happen such as teaching something that contradicts the Bible, but as long as the foundation remains firmly planted in the Word of God, the church has been allowed enough flexibility to change in order to meet the needs of those who are now attending.

I will say that this myth is plausible because some people might hate what is already there but overall, it is not the main reason for trying to replace something. Some change is good.

### Evangelism (Karena Mason)

When you hear the term “evangelism”, what is your first thought? Is it of missionaries teaching about God overseas? Is it foreign missionaries coming to the United States? Or maybe its a church group evangelizing in a local community? Though these methods differ, they all have something in common: spreading the gospel. As Christians, God calls us to “Go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation...” (Mark 16:15). And the gospel is this: “Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit” (Acts 2:38). God wants us to tell others of His great and mighty deeds, so that they might follow Him as well.

During my time in Uganda in 2017, I took part in many evangelical activities. Our group evangelized while providing villages with clean water, treating them of jiggers (small insects that infect the foot), giving children new shoes, and so on. Providing individuals with their basic needs while telling them about Jesus was a very affective way to spread the gospel. In fact, these people became so intrigued that the majority of them wanted to hear and learn more about our Lord. My experience differs greatly from what many will experience in their time, and I am truly thankful that God gave me such a unique opportunity. Though this trip was very special, the work we did is no more important than the work that is done anywhere else in the world, including the United States. Evangelism is important and significant everywhere we go. So spread the gospel whenever you can, because you never know whose life you may be influencing.

## Transformed

*"If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come."  
2 Corinthians 5:17*

Somehow, I always feel happier, more buoyant, on the days I get to wear new clothes to work or church. You too?

There's just something about the newness, the freshness, that creates confidence and the expectation of a great day ahead.

Here's the thing, though. No matter how fresh and attractive our clothes and makeup, these things are all externals. They're all on the outside. We may look stylish, fresh, put together. But inside? That can be a different story altogether.

The promise God makes in 2 Corinthians 5:17 dives well below the surface. "The new has come!" the Bible says. The word for new means "fresh, novel, uncommon." God's creative work in us cuts to the core of our being. It addresses realities far deeper than what we wear, far deeper than outward appearances.

The changes our Lord promises to make in us amount to a total transformation! Picture a newly minted gold coin. Picture a rosebud that bursts into bloom right before your eyes.

After his sin of adultery and murder, King David prayed, *"Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me."* Psalm 51:10

The word create in this prayer goes back—all the way back—to Eden. It is a word borrowed from the first creation, the day God made the heavens and the earth. In this verse, David is asking God to give him a brand-new beginning, a totally fresh start. "Remake my heart," he prays. We long for that, pray for that, too, don't we?!

God hears that prayer! He is recreating, remaking, transforming us. Because Jesus endured the punishment for our sins on Calvary's cross, transformation is possible. In Jesus, by faith in Jesus, we are God's new creations! And as He continues His transforming work in us, He whispers this promise to our heart: "My precious child, the best is yet to come."






## "Pray for FCC"
