## What Kind of Church is First Christian Church?

First Christian Church is a non-denominational Elders-led Church located in Greenwood, SC. We are part of the movement to restore the simplicity of New Testament Christianity. We believe that Jesus Christ is the son of God, that He lived a sinless life, offered His life for ours on the Cross, and rose on the third day to live forever. We believe that salvation comes through simple obedience to the plan of salvation that is laid out in the pages of the New Testament.



### Core Beliefs

**FP#42 (9/30)** - Student athletes, working students, and those involved with music are some of the hardest working, motivated students in the school. ## GET GOOD LOGISTICAL SUPPORT

(Taken from "The Management Methods of Jesus")

A misconception many people have, and one I had for many years, is that Jesus traveled around Palestine, fulfilling His plan, with only a small band of followers. This is erroneous. A careful reading of the Gospels reveals that a significant number of people accompanied Him. As we learned earlier, at one time He sent out seventy men, two by two, to test them in the field. There is no reason to think the seventy included everyone who was with Him at the time. There could have been many more.

Several passages in the Scriptures refer to "many women" who were with Jesus' traveling company and who followed Him all the way to Jerusalem and to His death on the cross. We know in another instance there were 120 of His followers gathered in a large room.

Now Jesus was devoting His time to teaching, doing the essential work only He could do. Not once do we read of Him dealing with the enormous logistical operation that must have been necessary to meet the needs of His people. This, of course, is ripe with lessons for us. First of all, it is absolutely essential that managers not get bogged down in logistical details. I know of a CEO of a multinational company who allowed himself to get involved in choosing desks for secretaries, allotting office space for very junior people, and other minutiae. This not only drove his people crazy, it kept him from doing the things only he could do. Jesus did not get involved with details. He used His staff for those. Jesus did the things only He could do. Don't get trapped into handling small details. Make sure you are as free as possible to do the things only you can do - the things you were placed in your position to do and the things upon which you will be judged.

## LEARN A LITTLE HUMILITY

(Taken from "The Management Methods of Jesus")


The image of the insufferably arrogant business executive is too close to reality for comfort. In my own career, I have seen examples of unbelievable arrogance on the part of top business executives. I am sure I have displayed an unseemly amount myself. I have also seen this arrogance come back to haunt those who came to believe in their own invulnerability. A few years back, one of the legendary despots of the publishing industry finally, after years of abusing subordinate and lesser lights in his industry, got his. His bosses got fed up with his arrogance and summarily dismissed him. As the *Wall Street Journal* said, "He still doesn't get it." This guy's company was making money. He was lionized in many quarters, but his arrogance caught up with him. Now he is history.

You would think in a business as volatile as television, even the top executives would know how precarious in their perch. Don't fall into the trap of arrogance. Not only is it unseemly, it is bad business. One way to combat it is to keep a picture in your mind of Jesus Christ, God's perfect son, kneeling before ordinary men, his own disciples, washing their feet.







## REFLECTIONS ON THE RESTORATION

"Barton W. Stone (Part 1)" (Taken from Earl's Restoration History class for the local church)

### Early Life:

1. Born December 24, 1772 (Died in 1844) at Port Tobacco MD, to John and Mary Warren Stone (Family owned 16 slaves, south averaged 4, indicates upper-middle class family)
2. Family was associated with the Church of England where Stone was sprinkled as an infant
3. After Stone's father died in 1779, they moved to VA just north of the NC border (Stone recalled how as a lad he watched his older brothers leave home to fight in the Revolutionary War, and he also heard the sound of artillery only 30 miles from his home. He developed a dislike for the British and anyone who supported them.)

### Education:

In 1790, Stone attended David Caldwell's academy in Guilford County near Greensboro, NC (This was a Presbyterian "Log College" which is a typical one-teacher frontier school much like home-schooling. Graduated in 1793 and wanted to be a lawyer, but changed his mind.)

### Conversion:

1. After the Revolutionary War and before college (Youth), Stone heard Baptist and Methodist preachers (No rules, they bashed each other from the pulpit)
2. While at the academy, Stone was somewhat convicted and troubled by the preaching of a visiting evangelist and revivalist, James McGready (2nd Great Awakening) who vividly portrayed heaven and hell
3. In February, 1791, Stone heard John Blair Smith, president of Hampden-Sydney College, preach on a Sunday morning. The message gave him a measure of hope and joy. (Unfortunately, he heard McGready again that night, and this threw him into depression because the sermon was about self-deception.)
4. William Hodge was a young New Light Presbyterian at Caldwell's school. Stone heard his message on the love of God for sinners. (Stone experienced conversion)

Sometimes, those two worlds collide and I come face to face with somebody who thinks his way is the only way and if we don't agree with him, we must be reading something wrong. It happens often and when it does, I just shake my head because his teaching may have many great points but that attitude makes me want to throw out his entire book.


The problem is that everybody wants to have unity based on the truth which is in God's Word, but it is hard to accomplish when so many people disagree on exactly what that truth is. We tend to find something that satisfies our need for understanding and we run with it. We run with it and then run over anybody who tries to stand in our way. Instead of welcoming opposing views so we can grow stronger in our own knowledge, we shun those who dare speak against our conclusions, and that opens the door for false teaching to rear its ugly head.

Sometimes, having the right answer does not do any good because of the attitude of arrogance we have with that right answer. We claim that anybody who opposes our interpretation is wrong and they do not take the Bible seriously because they don't see it the way we see it. This works against us when we try to reach across the borders and into the main stream of churches known as denominations. To be fair, some of them are just as guilty from their side especially when they lean so heavily on part of the Bible while neglecting the rest of it. Some would make statements that if you believe in the Word, you will understand what it is saying, but they fail to understand the meaning of Acts 2:38, Romans 6, and others that point to a more active process for salvation than the prayer that is so popular today.

How can we prevent such arrogance when we study the Bible? I read a good suggestion from a book earlier today. He said that we should picture the creator of the universe bowing down in front of His disciples washing their feet. We should love knowledge but love people more!

## Books of Poetry: Proverbs

(Several sources used each month)



### Introduction

Proverbs, like Psalms, names multiple individuals as the authors of its various sections. Solomon was uniquely qualified to serve as the principal author for this book of wise sayings. In fact, Solomon identified himself as the source of most of the book. His name appears at the beginning of three distinct sections—Proverbs 1:1, 10:1, and 25:1—covering almost all of the first twenty-nine chapters of the book. The final two chapters identify Agur (30:1) and Lemuel (31:1) as their authors, though the identities of these men remain mysterious in history.

The composition of Proverbs remains one of the most difficult questions about the book. Its strong association with Solomon means most of its contents were completed prior to his death in 931 BC. Clearly the book stayed in the southern kingdom of Judah, as Hezekiah's men compiled more of Solomon's proverbs in Proverbs 25–29. This indicates that the book was likely in its final form sometime before the end of Hezekiah's reign in 686 BC.

### Why is Proverbs so important?

Proverbs accomplishes something no other biblical book does: it simply compiles numerous short instructions for living an effective life on earth. While other books articulate profound theological truths, lengthy narratives of triumph and failure, or prophetic preaching to a disobedient people, Proverbs concerns itself completely with instructing people in the path of wisdom. The writers of the book recognized the varied circumstances of a person's life and provided principles to apply in a variety of situations rather than instructions to follow in only a few specific instances.

### What's the big idea?

Proverbs states its theme explicitly very early in the book: "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge" (Proverbs 1:7). The fear of the Lord refers to our viewing Him with the respect He deserves. It means living our lives in light of what we know of Him, holding Him in the highest estimation, and depending on Him with humble trust. Only then, Proverbs teaches, will we discover knowledge and wisdom (see also 9:10).

Solomon hoped that his readers would attain practical righteousness in all things and that we would do this by living our lives under the authority and direction of God. He specifically explained the book's purpose in 1:2–6, focusing on imparting understanding that would impact every facet of our lives. Much of the book emphasizes listening to others so that we might learn from them and apply the combined knowledge of those who have gone before us—such as parents and elders—to the unique circumstances of our own lives (1:5, 8). Wisdom then involves appropriating a measure of humility, first before God and then before others.

### How do I apply this?

Read it! Then live it! Proverbs contains some of the most applicable nuggets of truth in all of the Bible. Most of the proverbs are pithy statements brimming over with imagery from the real world. This approach allows us to see very clearly how any particular proverb might be applied to any number of everyday situations we encounter—from getting out of bed in the morning to building a strong foundation in our relationships with others. Proverbs reminds us that God concerns Himself not just with the big, cataclysmic events of life but even those mundane, "invisible" moments in our lives as well.



**This month's Church myth:** "The Bible is not true unless everybody agrees..."

This church myth is kind of annoying because those who want to reject God try to use this for a reason to not trust the Bible. The idea that everybody must agree about what it says before the Bible can be declared as truth is absurd because the reader does not determine the validity of a books' claims simply by agreeing with other readers. They also cannot declare something to be false if the author told the truth when writing it. The author is the one who determines the truth of what was written and since God is the author of the Bible, and God is true, the content of what He wrote through the Apostles and Prophets is true. There is nothing false about the Bible even if we cannot agree about what it says.

If this is true, why are there people who cannot agree on certain parts of the Bible? The short answer is that we are humans trying to figure out what a supernatural being wrote. Even though He used human authors, God was speaking from His heart and that is something we fail to understand because of our human limitations. Some parts of the Bible are hard to agree on because we are dealing with spiritual matters, other parts are hard because we are trying to read a translation of something that was written thousands of years ago in a foreign language. We have come a long way in understanding what has been written, but there are still some parts that are debated among scholars.

One example of this is the days of creation we find in Genesis. Many people including myself believe that those days are 24 hour periods of time, but there are other Christians who believe that those days represent periods of development like the stages of evolution. There is a legit claim using the original language but it takes some maneuvering to make it work. However, even though we may disagree on what Genesis 1 really says concerning the days of creation, there is no reason to claim that the Bible is false and we should not accuse others of not taking God's Word as the truth. It is possible to believe a misinterpretation of scripture and still take God's Word as the truth. The problem is in our understanding of the text, not our belief that it is from God.

Considering the fact that many hard to understand parts of the Bible are still being debated among scholars who believe the Bible to be true, I would say that this myth is busted because we don't have to agree on everything in the Bible to believe the Bible is the Word of God given to us so we can learn more about Him. We should study it and try to understand it to the best of our humanly limited abilities and have faith that God is still true whether we understand Him or not.

### Reach (Karena Mason)

If you're an introvert like me, you probably have a hard time reaching out to people. You may keep to yourself in big crowds, you may not try to make conversation with people, and you may be crippled with the fear of being judged. I struggle with all of these traits on occasion. Being an introvert, I tend to struggle with making new friends.

We just gained three new students in the college group I'm in (Catamounts for Christ) at WCU. Being the introvert that I am, I had a hard time making conversation with them. Instead of focusing on making them feel welcomed, I focused on myself, and how awkward I felt.

As Christians, we are called to reach out to people. We cannot get caught up in our human nature; wanting to close people off when we feel uncomfortable. If we spend all of our time thinking of ourselves and not others, we can miss opportunities to make connections with our brothers and sisters in Christ. In order to better reach out to others we must first reach up to God. When we draw our focus onto our Creator, connecting with others becomes a simpler, and more joyous, experience. Coinciding with reaching up to God, we must also reach into ourselves. When we search our hearts and let God show us how to become better Christians, we are ultimately better at reaching out to those around us. As you can see, there is a lot of reaching that is a necessity for Christians. So reach up to God, reach into yourself, and reach out to God's people.

*"And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near." – Hebrews 10:24-25*

## Made and Reclaimed

*"Thus says the LORD, your Redeemer, who formed you from the womb: I am the LORD, who made all things, who alone stretched out the heavens, who spread out the earth by myself."  
Isaiah 44:24*

The coffee shop in which I often write is in a building built more than a century ago. When the current owners moved in, they reclaimed and repurposed much of the junk they found in the attic. That junk is now on display as art. It hangs on the walls, sits in display cases, and sparks many an interesting conversation between customers and baristas.

The history of that junk can be summed up in four words: Designed. Formed. Ruined. Restored.

If we're honest with ourselves, we must admit those four words describe our own personal history as God's creations, too:

- Our Creator formed us; He crafted us as His unique works of art. From life's beginning, we had a wonderful purpose. Our existence was intended to honor Him.
- We rebelled. By rejecting the purpose for which we were created, we ruined our potential to live meaningful lives. We walked away from the only authentic source of truth, beauty, life.
- In love, God refused to let us go. He rescued us in Jesus, our Savior. He redeemed us in the cross of Jesus. Even now, the divine Artist is at work, restoring in us the beauty of holiness He intended from the beginning.

In Ephesians 2, Paul sums up this story, our story:

*"By grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them."  
Ephesians 2:8-10*





# Places to go, People to see, Things to do


