The best way to ensure a spiritually healthy life is to talk to God everyday through prayer and let Him speak to us through the Bible. To help us with our spiritual health, I am providing a weekly prayer emphasis along with scripture readings based on Mark Moore's book "Core 52." In his book, he provides 52 passages that make up a core of Bible knowledge for Christians. By reading these passages, we can raise our Biblical IQ and strengthen our foundation that will help us withstand the storms of life that come our way.

### Week of March 1:

- Prayer Emphasis: Discipleship
- Core 52:
  - + Read John 10
  - + Memorize Psalm 23:1-3
  - + Meditate on Ezekiel 34:3-4; 1 Timothy 3:1; 1 Peter 2:25

### Week of March 22:

- Prayer Emphasis: Evangelism
- Core 52:
  - + Read John 5-6
  - + Memorize Psalm 110:1
  - + Meditate on Matthew 16:16-18, 22:41-46; Acts 2:34-35

### Week of March 29:

- Prayer Emphasis: Missions
- Core 52:
  - + Read Acts 3-5
  - + Memorize Psalm 118:22
  - + Meditate on Isaiah 7:14; Matthew 21:33-46; Acts 4:11

The word "Meditate" basically means to reflect on the passage and dig deep to find the application for your life.

## BE FAIR TO ALL, GENEROUS IF APPROPRIATE

(Taken from "The Management Methods of Jesus")

In our company, we have sometimes failed to reward one person sufficiently for fear of what some other employee might think. The reasoning goes this way: "If we give Bill the bonus he really deserves, Max will hear about it and be upset that he didn't get one." Max was being paid all that he had been promised and had not performed as exceptionally as Bill. If we were being fair to Max, we shouldn't worry about what he thinks of Bill's compensation. To do so is to cheat Bill out of his rightful reward.

Jesus taught this principle clearly in the parable about the landowner who paid the worker he had hired last (who had worked a much shorter time) the same as those who had worked all day. When confronted about this by one who had worked all day, the landowner replied, "Friend, I am doing you no wrong... Take what is yours and go your way. I wish to give to this last man the same as to you. Is it not lawful for me to do what I wish with my own things? Or is your eye evil because I am good?" (Matthew 20:13-15). Be fair to all. Be generous when generosity is merited.

## BE A RISK TAKER

(Taken from "The Management Methods of Jesus")

Anyone who thinks Jesus would advocate only a stodgy, ultraconservative business philosophy has never read or understood the parable of the talents as recorded in Matthew 25:14-30. In this famous and forceful story, Jesus describes how a man going away on a journey entrusted sums of money to his workers to handle for him while he was away. He entrusted the most money to the ones with the most ability. Those who invested the funds and multiplied them earned the man's praise. However, the one who buried the funds entrusted to him and returned only the amount he was given received the man's wrath.

The lesson of the parable is that we are to multiply our assets by investing them wisely. Jesus clearly knew that there are risks involved with investing, but the servants who doubled the money entrusted to them are put forth as good examples to us all. The servant who buried the money entrusted to him was called "wicked" and "lazy." He was told that the least he could have done was to put the money on deposit in a bank so it could have earned some interest.

## LET YOUR RESULTS SPEAK FOR YOU



## REFLECTIONS ON THE RESTORATION

“Thomas Campbell (Part 2)” (Taken from Earl’s Restoration History class for the local church)

### Continuing Contributions:

1. Thomas continued to preach and teach throughout Ohio and Kentucky, and then back to Pennsylvania. Between 1817 and 1819, he made several preaching tours to Indiana.
2. He assisted his son Alexander in teaching at Buffalo Seminary (In Alexander’s house). In 1843, he was semi-retired although he continued teaching at Bethany college in WV.
3. He died on January 4, 1854.

### The Declaration and address of the Christian Association of Washington, PA:

1. Created by Thomas to represent the purposes and objectives of the association.
2. This was not designed to be a creed, and they had no intention of creating a church.
3. The Brush Run Church started after the Presbyterian Church rejected the association.
4. Declaration and Address had 4 parts:

Declaration: A few pages explaining the origins of the association

Address: Further description of the divided state of Christendom in 13 propositions

Appendix: Longest section with answers to objections and further clarification of goals

Postscript: Written 3 months later containing a proposal for a periodical publication

When writing the Declaration and Address, Thomas Campbell had frustrations with the many splits and fights in the Presbyterian Church. Most of these fights were not even understood by the ones fighting, so Thomas Campbell decided to work on using the Bible as the authority to settle issues in regard to church structure, and membership. In his Declaration and Address, He lays the foundation for others to stand up for the unity of the church based on the Bible alone.

## BACK PORCH CONVERSATIONS

(This month's article was originally written in 2015 as a blog post)



When parents make church optional for their children, they are sending out a message that God is not as important as He should be in their lives. And when God is not a priority, the family suffers. The problem is that the church has been separated from God as if you can be part of one without the other. However, the church is the bride of Christ, and because God uses the marriage analogy, the 2 have become 1. What God has joined together, let no man tear apart! We cannot accept Jesus if we reject His Bride.

This is the point where the critics of the church come out to tell us that the church is not a building. The church is a family of believers who meet together on a regular basis. While I agree that the church building is not the point, it is hard to deny that passage in Hebrews about meeting together as the church. If the church is not meeting in a building on a regular basis, where are they meeting?

The argument about the church vs. the church building is a red herring that bogs down the discussion and causes us to miss the point. Whether we meet in a building, a home, a school cafeteria, a store front, or the side of a highway, the point is that when we meet together, church happens, and this should NEVER be OPTIONAL!


By nature, we are a relational species. Even the extreme introvert longs for somebody to talk to at times when loneliness rears its ugly head. We crave relationships, and this is by design because God is a relational God. We are built for relationships, and that means we need a group to belong to which is why God created the church. The church is an essential part of a healthy spiritual life and when it is missing; our kids will fill the void with a counterfeit. That counterfeit could be a group of friends who may or may not be the best influence for their lives.

We are a relational species, and we are also a worshipful species.

We have been created with a desire to worship something or someone, and this is the highest level of love and devotion. Why do you think God told us to worship Him only? If we are the Bride of Christ, the highest level of our love belongs to Him. We can love our spouses but we are not allowed to worship them. Our worship is reserved for the Almighty because He is the only One worthy of a higher level of love than what we give in a marriage. That is why we need to be careful when deciding who or what we worship.

Do we really want our kids to decide who to worship if they are not old enough to decide who to marry? Some decisions are not meant for children because they are not old enough to handle them.

## The Major Prophets: Ezekiel (Several sources used each month)



### Who wrote the book?

The book of Ezekiel takes its title from the priest of the same name, son to a man named Buzi. Ezekiel's priestly lineage shines through in his prophetic ministry; he often concerned himself with topics such as the temple, the priesthood, the glory of the Lord, and the sacrificial system. Ezekiel 1:1 tells us that the prophecy began "in the thirtieth year." Scholars usually consider this a reference to Ezekiel's age, making him about the same age as Daniel, who was exiled to Babylon nearly a decade earlier. Like many priests of Israel, Ezekiel was married. But when his wife died during his prophetic ministry, God prevented Ezekiel from mourning her in public as a sign of Judah's lack of concern for the things of God. (Ezekiel 24:16–24)

Ezekiel lived among the Jewish exiles in Babylon at a settlement along the river Chebar called Tel-abib (Ezekiel 3:15), less than one hundred miles south of Babylon. The invading Babylonians brought about ten thousand Jews to the village in 597 BC, including Ezekiel and the last king of Judah, Jehoiachin (2 Kings 24:8–14). Ezekiel's prophecy began a mere five years into his time at Tel-abib (Ezekiel 1:2), and he continued to prophesy among the people for at least twenty-two years (29:17). Because he spoke to a people whom God had exiled due to their continued rebellion against Him, a majority of Ezekiel's message communicates judgment for sins.

### What's the big idea?

God didn't exile the Israelites primarily to punish them. God never has been nor is He now interested in punishment for punishment's sake. Rather, He intended the punishment or judgment in Ezekiel's day as a means to an end—to bring His people to a state of repentance and humility before the one true God. They had lived for so long in sin and rebellion, confident in their own strength and that of the neighboring nations, that they needed God to remind them of His holy nature and their humble identity in a most dramatic way. After centuries of warnings, prophetic messages, and invasions, God decided that more significant action was required—He had to remove the people from their promised land.

### How do I apply this?

Ezekiel's entire prophetic ministry centered around the small exiled community at Tel-abib, a people uprooted from their homes and livelihoods living out their days in a foreign land. Can you imagine the feelings of disorientation and confusion that accompanied these people? Even though many of the exiles were directly engaged in the sinful behavior that led to God's judgment, that would not prevent them from wondering why all this was happening to them.

We sometimes find ourselves in that predicament as well, asking "Why, Lord?" and waiting in silence for the answer. The exiles had to wait five years for God to send Ezekiel, and when God did, His prophet had a message that the people likely didn't want to hear: God is the Lord of heaven and earth, and the judgment the people were experiencing was a result of their own sin. The book of Ezekiel reminds us to seek out the Lord in those dark times when we feel lost, to examine our own lives, and to align ourselves with the one true God.



**This month's Church myth:** "Making church optional encourages independent faith"

(To address this myth, I am sharing part of an article I wrote for my blog in 2015)

"We want our children to choose for themselves whether or not to go to church."

As we continue the theme of quotes that are often used, the above quote comes in various forms. The main idea behind this quote is that parents want their kids to develop their own faith in God, but the dangerous side effect is that kids could end up turning away from God before getting to know Him first.

I seriously doubt that a Christian family would support the idea of a child rejecting God, but this could be the result of making church optional.

I realize that this may be considered an extreme position since the popular way of thinking is that our children benefit from having the freedom to choose what is best for their lives. But I would not be writing this article if I did not believe that this is something we need to think about. While a child's freedom to choose is certainly a worthy goal to work towards, there are some decisions that belong to parents. For example, a child should not have the freedom to choose whether or not to go to school because most of the time, if given the option, they will not choose school. Their minds need to develop before they can understand that an education is good for them.

Another example would involve choosing who to marry. It is a fun game to play marriage and while I was growing up, I had plenty of "wives" around me, but I have a hard time believing that my parents would have allowed me to walk down the aisle with the wife of my choosing when I was still in elementary school. Of course, if I had the freedom to choose whether or not to go to school, I would not have been in elementary school!

### Created in God's Image (Karena Mason)

In Genesis chapter 1, we read about God creating the universe, the planet we live on, the plants and animals that inhabit Earth, and the process of creating humans. Genesis 1:27 says, "So God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created them; male and female He created them." God wanted us as humans to mirror His image, so that He may shine through us in this life we have been given. Unfortunately, many of us – including myself – tend to take our lives, and the way that He specially created us, for granted.

At some point or another, we will wish that we looked different, acted different, or just wish that we were a different person altogether. However, we ought to spend our days rejoicing in the qualities God has given us! He made each of us unique and special, and He made us all different on purpose! If we all looked, acted, or had the same talents as each other, the world would not be the same! The Bible tells us that God created each of us differently, so that we can fulfill each part of the Body of Christ. Our bodies function most efficiently with two arms, two legs, ears, a mouth, and so on. Each person in the Body works together to complete tasks, and to take care of each other. We each have our own talents and spiritual gifts, which were crafted in the image of God Himself. When we live like Christ, we embody His attributes and look more like Him. And when we live more like Him, He shines brighter in our lives. So the next time you look in the mirror, don't pick out your insecurities and the things you wish that you could change. Instead, let's see God in our reflection.

## Best Friends Forever

*"A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for adversity." - Proverbs 17:17*

It is hard to read the Old Testament and not see Jesus on every page. Perhaps, though, no Old Testament passage describes the promised Savior more simply and more warmly than Proverbs 17:17.

Of course, we recognized the truth of these words in our human relationships. All of us have experienced the genuine care of friends, especially in times of trouble. Sadly, most of us have also endured the pain created by "fair-weather friends," people who feigned friendship for a season and then walked away when we most needed them.

We also recognize that even sincere friends cannot always help. Other people have their own lives to live. Circumstances sometimes prevent promise keeping. Death separates the best of friends—even couples who have shared 40, 50, and even 60 years of marriage.

Keeping all this in mind, the fuller meaning of Proverbs 17:17 becomes clear. The only Friend who loves at all times, the only Friend who can love at all times, is our Friend, Jesus. The only Friend who sticks with us in every adversity is our Brother and Savior, the Lord Jesus.

This truth becomes even more precious when we remember Jesus loves us even when the pain we endure is self-inflicted. He could justly abandon us, leaving us to live in the messes we have made. But he does not! Instead, he whispers words of true and never-ending friendship to our hearts:

*"I will never leave you nor forsake you." - Hebrews 13:5*

*"When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior." - Isaiah 43:2-3*

No sine is too great, no number of sins are too many to be swept away by the flood of grace that flows from Calvary's cross. Likewise, no problem is unsolvable, no pain unbearable, when we remember that Jesus stands by us. Jesus is our Friend at all times. Jesus is our Brother in all adversity.





In *Bad Girls of the Bible: And What We Can Learn From Them*, Liz Curtis Higgs examines the lives, situations, and personalities of ten Bad Girls from the Bible. She argues that many women may not connect as well with the Good Girls of the Bible, like Ruth, Mary, and Esther, because earthly women are sinful and mess up from time to time. The Bad Girls of the Bible give women who have their own pasts to deal with examples of what to do or not to do in their own lives. Higgs argues that while women can learn from the Good Girls, they can also learn from the Bad Girls of the Bible as well.

In this book, Higgs chooses ten Bad Girls to focus on. Some of these women play prominent roles in the Bible, while others are barely mentioned. Yet, Higgs argues that they each have something to teach the modern woman about what not to do, as well as how to live a better life in Christ. Higgs includes the following Bad Girls: Eve, Potiphar's wife, Lot's wife, the woman at the well, Delilah, Sapphira, Rahab, Jezebel, Michal, and the sinful woman. She identifies each of them as being bad to the bone, bad for a season, or bad for a moment.




