Spiritual Growth Exercise (Dessert)

Find a place where you can walk without many distractions. The Lander walking track is a good place. The mall is good for rainy days. During those walks, try to focus on talking to God by praying as you go. If it helps, take some praise music with you so you can shut off the rest of the world while you walk. The point is for the music to help you focus on talking to God so try to stay away from songs that cause you to sing along. The goal is for this to be background music so the conversation with God can be top priority.

After you finish your walk, take a moment to write down any thoughts that come to mind. Was God trying to tell you something? Did you think about something you need to work on in your life? Did you think about a friend while you were walking? Perhaps God is telling you to talk to your friend about something. Journaling your thoughts will help you remember the conversation and you can stay organized so you can see God moving in your life.

If you can take a walk once per week, that would be great! This walk can help you settle down and tune your mind to God which can help you have peace during the tough moments in your life. This is part of that peace that passes understanding that God can provide.

WHY IS IT HARD FOR CHURCHES TO GROW?

When I drove to Atlanta a few weeks ago to pick up my brother's car for our vacation, I knew that traffic was going to happen. Anytime you go to Atlanta, you should not be surprised to see traffic. Why does this happen? The short answer is that anytime you have a lot of people on the road, you will most likely end up with traffic. This is why we should never be in a hurry when driving through Atlanta.

I decided to take a picture while I was stopped on the ramp that goes from Highway 316 to I-85 to show the traffic that was on the horizon. I knew that this was going to take a while so I had to make a plan to keep myself from going crazy. My plan was similar to the plan I used when I was a courier for a couple of years while living in Atlanta. I will talk about that plan a little later.

When thinking about the churches in Greenwood SC, it is kind of like the traffic in the picture. We have so many churches, it becomes hard to move around without running into somebody else who is part of a church. This makes it hard to find people who need a church home. Most of the people I talk to already have a church they are attending, so it would not make sense for them to want to visit ours. Of course, it never hurts to ask but more often than not, they are not looking for a church when they are faithfully attending one. And here is the assumption. We assume that if a person is already part of a church, they are not interested in visiting another church. This is assuming a lot because there are many people who may be thinking about changing churches if somebody would take the time to invite them. That is why we should go ahead and invite them to our church. The worst that could happen is that they say no and if they do, that's ok because we cannot force people to leave their church to attend ours.

How can we grow a church when there are so many churches already here? The answer lies in the plan I use when driving in traffic. When I drive in traffic, I usually pick a lane and stick with it until it is time for me to exit. That helps me relax because I don't have to worry about changing lanes to make sure I don't miss my exit. I just drive in the lane I need and take my time while driving. Unfortunately, others do not have this same plan because they get worked up and try to change lanes as often as they can because they want to beat the other cars to the front of the pack. When they do this, the result is usually a slower, longer, more painful experience. That is why it is best to stop trying to beat everybody else. Just pick a lane and stay in it. Life will work out much better if you do that.

When trying to get people to visit our church, we need to stop worrying about the other churches and just work on who we are and what we do. In other words, we need to pick our lane and stay in our lane. What makes our church special? Why do we choose our church over the others? If we know why we go to our church, we can tell others so they can decide if they want to visit us. Who knows? There could be others looking for a church that is like ours and all it would take is a conversation to get them to visit.

As we continue to travel down the road with all of the other churches in the area, we need to have patience and just keep moving the way we are created to move. Let's figure out what makes our church special and lead with that. Let other churches worry about themselves and let God help us become the church He created us to be.

"It is Well With My Soul" written by Horatio G. Spafford

Horatio Spafford was one person than knew of life's unexpected twists and turns. He was very familiar with the tragedy that can come at a moment's notice. Spafford was a very successful lawyer and real estate agent. In 1891, there was a devastating fire in Chicago and he lost a great deal. While trying to overcome that loss, his four year old son lost his battle with Scarlett Fever. Him and his wife decided that a vacation is just what the family needed. He packed up his wife and four daughters and put them on a ship bound for England. He would be meeting them after finishing up some matters at home. While sailing in the Atlantic, the ship sank. Over 200 people perished in the wreckage, including Horatio's four daughters. His wife made it safely to England and sent a telegram that began, "Saved alone. What shall I do?" Upon receiving the telegram, Horatio immediately sailed for England. The captain of the ship knew of the tragedy that Spafford was suffering so when they came close to the site of the crash, he let Horatio know where they were. While sailing over the spot where he lost his four children, and after losing his son, plus many assets in a fire, God was there to comfort him. God gave him these words that have become so near and dear to many people.


If the song has one overarching Scripture reference, I'd say its Romans 8:28-39, especially verses 38 and 39.

Epistles: Galatians

Who wrote the book?

Galatians has always been among those Pauline epistles least challenged on the issue of authorship. Paul wrote to the churches in southern Galatia after having a hand in starting them on his first missionary journey to Asia Minor. Paul's close relationship to these churches helps to explain the extremely strong tone he took with them from the very beginning of the letter. Galatians exhibits Paul at his angriest, as he risked the good favor of the converts in those churches to make sure they were on the path of truth and not led off into deception. In fact, to emphasize the seriousness of his purpose, he took the pen from his scribe and wrote the end of the letter himself in large letters (Galatians 6:11). Upon arriving back in Antioch from his first missionary journey after eighteen months on the road, Paul received a report that the churches he had started in Galatia had fallen into hard times—specifically, they had fallen into error. A group of Judaizers—those who sought to make living under the Mosaic Law a requirement of the Christian faith—had gained an influence in the Galatian churches. Paul wrote the book a few months before his attendance at the Jerusalem Council in AD 49, a meeting where the apostles would take up this very topic (Acts 15:1–30).

Why is Galatians so important?

In advance of the Jerusalem Council, Paul's letter speaks wisdom and clarity into the first real controversy that plagued the church in its early years—the relationship between Christian Jews and Christian Gentiles. Paul's aggressive tone shows just how important it was to him that the people embrace unity in Christ, no matter their racial distinctions. For him, this was no minor issue, as he went so far as to call the Galatians deserters of Christ, people turning from the truth toward a gospel contrary to the one they had received from Paul (Galatians 1:6–9).

When the Galatians fell away so quickly from the gospel of grace Paul had preached to them, they also made clear their disloyalty to Paul's authority as an apostle. Therefore, Paul began the letter to the Galatians by spending two chapters defending that very issue. Only in chapter 3 did he begin to get to the heart of their error; namely, that these Galatians sought to be justified by the Mosaic Law. In contrast, Paul presented his argument that justification comes to people by faith in Jesus Christ, not by their works under the Law. Part of the problem that confronted the Galatians came in one of the arguments made by the Judaizers. These false teachers suggested that to live by grace and in freedom meant to live a lawless and therefore degenerate life. And so in the final chapters of the letter, Paul made clear that justification—an act of grace through faith—need not result in a sinful lifestyle. Because Christians have been freed from bondage to the sinful nature, we now have the path of holiness open to us.

Unfortunately, the false teaching brought to the Galatian churches by the Judaizers has been extremely difficult to root out even today. We must walk a fine line—on one hand, we do not want to fall into the legalism that the Galatians struggled with, but on the other, we cannot just live as if anything goes. The Christian's commitment to Christ is based on the free gift of grace through faith, but as Paul articulated at the end of Galatians, it also results in a life of walking by the Spirit. Is the fruit of the Spirit evident in your life, or do you find yourself living according to the flesh or "the compulsions of selfishness" (Galatians 5:16–26 MESSAGE)? Too often we lose ourselves at the extremes, ending in a legalistic attempt to earn our salvation or a devil-may-care attitude about our sin. Use Paul's words in Galatians as an encouragement to pursue a life of holiness, not in your own strength but in the knowledge of God's empowering grace in your life.



This month's Church myth: "Making church optional encourages independent faith"

(To address this myth, I am sharing part of an article I wrote for my blog in 2015)

"We want our children to choose for themselves whether or not to go to church."

As we continue the theme of quotes that are often used, the above quote comes in various forms. The main idea behind this quote is that parents want their kids to develop their own faith in God, but the dangerous side effect is that kids could end up turning away from God before getting to know Him first.

I seriously doubt that a Christian family would support the idea of a child rejecting God, but this could be the result of making church optional.

I realize that this may be considered an extreme position since the popular way of thinking is that our children benefit from having the freedom to choose what is best for their lives. But I would not be writing this article if I did not believe that this is something we need to think about. While a child's freedom to choose is certainly a worthy goal to work towards, there are some decisions that belong to parents. For example, a child should not have the freedom to choose whether or not to go to school because most of the time, if given the option, they will not choose school. Their minds need to develop before they can understand that an education is good for them.

Another example would involve choosing who to marry. It is a fun game to play marriage and while I was growing up, I had plenty of "wives" around me, but I have a hard time believing that my parents would have allowed me to walk down the aisle with the wife of my choosing when I was still in elementary school. Of course, if I had the freedom to choose whether or not to go to school, I would not have been in elementary school!

Some decisions are not meant for children because they are not old enough to handle them.

Going to church should fall into this category too. When parents make church optional for their children, they are sending out a message that God is not as important as He should be in their lives. And when God is not a priority, the family suffers. The problem is that the church has been separated from God as if you can be part of one without the other. However, the church is the bride of Christ, and because God uses the marriage analogy, the 2 have become 1. What God has joined together, let no man tear apart!

BEING A GOOD MEMBER OF FCC GREENWOOD SC

Spread the Fragrance

"But thanks be to God who always leads us in triumphal procession in Christ and through us spreads everywhere the fragrance of the knowledge of Him." 2 Corinthians 2:14

The dictionary defines "fragrance" as a pleasant odor. The opposite of that would be the smell of a baby's dirty diaper! Yet how sweet the smell of a clean, freshly lotioned and powdered baby after his bath. Baby and mother are happy as the sweet smell permeates the nursery. One baby, two different smells. One you want to hand over to Mom as quickly as you can and the other you want to reach out and pick up from Mom's arms.

Today's scripture reading says that as we grow in the knowledge of Jesus Christ we become a sweet odor to others. We become a fragrance others want to enjoy and hang around with. In Riverside, California, where we live, the orange blossoms in the spring from our orange trees become so potent that the aroma permeates the entire area. The evenings are beautiful with the smell. We keep the bedroom French doors open just to enjoy the fragrance. After a while the blossoms die away and tiny green oranges appear. They slowly grow, and in the late fall those green oranges turn to orange. In December we begin to pick, eat, juice, and give away. But it isn't until late-January, mid-February, that the sugar content is at its height. That's when the fresh orange juice is oh-so-sweet and wonderful. But we never forget the fragrance of the first blooms. Does the fragrance die? Not at all. The smell of that sweet juice is just as wonderful as the blossoms.

What is your fragrance? Are you one who others don't want to be around? Or are others wanting to smell the freshness of your sweet spirit because you are a blossom so strong with the fragrance of the spirit of Christ? It takes the knowledge of God's Word to develop that fragrance, learning about God's holy book and the principles taught chapter by chapter.


Where do we begin? We begin with the tiny bloom of time in God's Word, the Bible. A little now, a little later, step-by-step as the months go by we begin to mature just like the orange. We become so full of God's juices that others want to pick us up and squeeze His fragrance from us. The sweetness gets even sweeter as we share His Word with others, pouring out what we've filled our juice pitcher with. As His fragrance enters others' lives, they then begin the same process, a small blossom growing to full maturity. As the process continues from person to person, our orange tree will be full of blossoms, creating a fragrance that can eventually permeated the whole city and eventually the world..




