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

- 6. That the Church is the body of Christ on earth and exists to save the lost and edify the saved. **Ephesians 4:1-16**
- 7. That Jesus Christ will one day return as King of Kings and Lord of Lords. 1 Thes 4:13-18
- 8. That those accepting Christ must repent of sin, confess their faith and be baptized into Him. Romans 10:9, Acts 2:38

In Matthew 14:22-33, Jesus was walking on the water to the boat where the Disciples were, and they thought He was a ghost. After realizing it was Jesus, Peter called out for Jesus to let him get out of the boat. Jesus said come and Peter began to walk on water! Unfortunately, this was short lived because he began to look at the waves around him and lost his focus on Jesus. When he took his eyes off of Jesus, he began to sink. In the same way, if we lose our focus, we will sink.

To help us focus as a church, we need to maintain our focus as Christians. For this reason, I am providing a set of focal points every month to be used at a pace of one per week every Monday. Each focal point is designed to be used with prayer as you reset your focus on the topic being addressed. For best results, find a place where you can remove as many distractions as possible before you begin. There is no time limit so take as much time as you feel you need for each point.

FP#1 - The new year brings new opportunities for improvements in your life. For many people, this is a time to make resolutions that they plan to keep. Unfortunately, those resolutions can be short lived if they are not part of everyday life. When reading daily scriptures that are provided in the church calendar, it can be easy to skip days if they are not part of your daily routine. Now is a good time to find a time during the day for reading those daily scriptures. Write that time down and make it part of your daily routine. This will help you keep a steady diet of God's Word and you will see a huge difference in your life because you are eating healthy in a spiritual way.

FP#2 - It takes 7 times for something to become a habit. What habit would you like to start this year? Is it reading more scripture, praying more, or even giving more to the offering? Whatever habit you would like to start, make up your mind to commit to 7 times in a row beginning now.

FP#3 - The church is only successful if the people make up their minds to help. What area of the church can you help with? Even if you have already been serving faithfully, there is always room for improvement so now is a good time to evaluate how you are serving and make a commitment to step up your service for the Lord.

FP#4 - Studies have shown that the church grows best when people are inviting people. Instead of trying to provide programs and events to attract people, the best approach is to reach out to your friends and bring them with you. The church will continue to create attractional elements but it is up to each of us to bring the people. Who can you invite to church this year?

"Are We Playing Jenga with Our Doctrine?" - Earl Winfrey

I love playing board games. Ever since I was a wee little lad, I have been able to enjoy the time well spent sliding down chutes and climbing ladders. I have jumped checkers, checked kings, hopped marbles, and sent opponent's pieces home without saying "Sorry." I have gone fishing, slapped jacks, grabbed spoons and even collected spades while trying to avoid hearts. I have purchased property, paid the high rent of hotels, luxury tax, collected \$200 and gone to jail. Lately, I have rolled 5 dice and went through 10 phases with my family. Games have been part of life, but there is one game I have no desire to play, and that game is Jenga.

Jenga does not interest me, but many people like the tension that develops while they remove each piece from the tower. For those who are not familiar with the game, you build a tower of blocks and then remove the pieces until the tower collapses. I'm sure there is some kind of strategy involved, but that is basically the game.

Along with playing board games, I have also been a fan of Jigsaw puzzles. I love the challenge of taking each piece and finding out where it fits to form the big picture that is on the box. My Granny used to have a big sheet of plywood she would place on a couple of card tables so we would be able to work on a 1,500 piece puzzle as a family. Every time I would visit, I would spend a few minutes at the puzzle to see if I can help the project move forward. When the puzzle is complete, we all sit back and enjoy the reward of being able to see the picture on the table. There have been some puzzles placed in frames because we liked the pictures, and they looked good on the wall.

A Jigsaw puzzle is a good example of how the different doctrines found in the Bible fit together to form the big picture of redemption. We can see the whole story when we take each piece and fit them together according to how God laid them out in the Bible. These doctrines make up our foundation as a church so it would be time well spent to learn more about them.

Unfortunately, there is a disturbing trend among preachers and church peeps concerning the Bible. Way too many times over the years, I have seen discussions about various topics with the conclusion drawn that it is not necessary to believe everything the Bible teaches. The latest doctrine on the chopping block is the virgin birth. The popular way of thinking is that the virgin birth is not as important as the resurrection so there is no need to believe in it. I can agree that the resurrection is the victory declaration over death, but the virgin birth drives home the point that no man can lay claim to Jesus, only God could be His Father.

Not believing in certain doctrines because they are not as "important" as the "major" doctrines is a dangerous game to play. Just like the game of Jenga, if you start removing doctrines piece by piece, you will soon end up with a belief system that has collapsed. Instead, we should be treating the doctrines like pieces of a Jigsaw puzzle that connect in order to give us the big picture that God wants us to see.

How can we treat the doctrines like Jigsaw puzzle pieces? I'm glad you asked!

Our first step is to recognize the value of each doctrine no matter how minor it may appear. Even the smallest detail can be combined with other pieces to form the picture of the Messiah. This is why we should always be looking for opportunities to connect passages of Scripture to each other.

While it is true that we need to study each book of the Bible on its own, we also need to surf the waves of thought that flow back and forth throughout the Old and New Testaments. We need to be able to take Matthew and work backwards through the prophecies that were spoken several hundreds years earlier. We can also take the book of Acts and jump into the letters written by the Apostles to see how they taught the different churches. Genesis leads to Exodus, but there is also a passage that can send you into the book of Job. And the Kings and Chronicles passages can be used for creating a timeline of Minor Prophets.

The Bible is a complex web of various styles of writing, teachings, historical accounts, and stories that can inspire us to live for God. When you take the time to study the various passages in the Bible, you will find a great reward which is the whole counsel of God.

I LOVE the Bible! Of course, you expect me to say that since I have devoted my life to knowing every inch of it from cover to cover. However, you can develop a love for the Bible too if you take the time to study, and that is where I can help you.

I can provide Bible studies for anyone who is interested. Whether it is a small group study using a book like "13 Lessons in Christian Doctrine" or an individual discipleship study to improve your Biblical knowledge, I am available for you if you are willing to commit to our time together.

I do not claim to know everything there is to know about the Bible, but I do know enough to lead you to a higher level of Bible knowledge so you can become a better role model for those who are following you. All it takes is for you to get motivated enough to ask.

NOTHING VENTURED, NOTHING GAINED

One of the blessings I had growing up in a poor family was the need to work on our own cars instead of paying for a mechanic. The result was a well rounded education for car maintenance, and with the variety of cars we had, there were very few cars we did not know anything about and even then, we had resources to help us learn how to work on them long before YouTube was created!

We joked about creating a shop and calling it Winfrey's Garage, but if we did, the problem would be that our cars would be the most frequented since we did not own cars that were created during the present decade. With our own family being our best customers, our profits would disappear quickly. However, there were plenty of times when our front yard looked like a used car lot with some cars

on jack stands, others on ramps, and a few were actually running. And when I moved out, I would return to the house because dad had all the tools and the knowledge just in case I needed help. And those days were full of great conversations too as part of the process. While working on the cars, we would talk about anything and nothing at all.

I remember one night I brought my car to the house for a routine brake pad change. It was a car that I just purchased so we did not have the Haynes manual yet, but since we have replaced brake pads often, how hard could it be? We spent about 2 hours on the pads trying to get the old ones off, but the caliper would not budge. It was getting late so I had to decide how critical it was to get them replaced that day. Since I had to work the next day, I had to put everything back on the car and continue driving on the pads that still had a few trips left before they became too worn. I felt like a failure and the thought of having to ask somebody else how to work on it frustrated me. I made a comment about how we wasted 2 hours and got nothing done, and that was when Dad said "Nothing ventured, nothing gained." We had to try to work on the car even if it meant we would not succeed. I returned the next day and Dad found out that there was a special way to turn the rotor in order to get the caliper to release. Woo-hoo!!!

When trying to improve the church, there may be moments when we feel like we are wasting time, and there may be changes that won't work, but we have to try something. Even if we end up falling down and having to regroup, we won't know what works until we try anything that could help. Trial and error is the best way sometimes because we aren't always going to know how to fix what appears to be broken. Sometimes God wants us to get moving first and then He will supply the answer. Nothing ventured, nothing gained.

Offer to watch your neighbor's child(ren) or pet(s).

Nothing says "I care for you" quite like watching someone's offspring...or pets who think they are offspring. Whether it's for a quick trip to the grocery store or a date night, offering to babysit or pet sit will provide your neighbor a break from reality... and peanut butter and jelly stains.

This month's Church myth: "Perfect attendance will get you into heaven"

I would hope that this month's myth could be easily busted because everybody knows that the only way to enter heaven is through the blood of Jesus. We are saved by grace not by works so having perfect attendance should not matter. However, I know that there are many people who will not admit that they think this way, but they act like missing church is the unpardonable sin. Now before you call an emergency meeting to have me removed, let me explain what I mean.

I wish everybody could show up every time the church doors are open, but that is just not realistic. People have responsibilities outside of church. People go on trips. People get sick. Sometimes, people get bored or they have something against the ones in charge. People are human so they will miss church. This includes the minister who did not go to church one Sunday while being on vacation! Oops!

So... What is the problem here? The problem is that some people will not tolerate a person missing something at church because they feel like the church should be more important than anything. While I may agree with that thought, I am not naive enough to think that today's society allows the church to have the same authority it once had. The church does not have the authority to demand people to show up, and that is a good thing. God does not want a church full of people who are treated more like employees and less like brothers and sisters.

For this reason, it is important for us to be careful about how hard we press people for reasons why they were absent. We can and should tell them that they were missed and we were curious about why they were out, but if they do not want to tell us why they missed, it really is none of our business. This is hard to hear especially since I grew up in a different age for the church, but the reality is that we need to be more respectful of people's privacy because the days of the pins for perfect attendance in Sunday School are gone.

We also need to be careful not to pass judgment when a person is absent. Not everybody misses because they don't love Jesus. They might have something going on that is keeping them away, and if they don't want to share it, we can still pray for that person instead of assuming the worst.

Perfect attendance will not get you into heaven, but we sure do hope you can make going to church a priority in 2024. We love all of our people and we hope they can take advantage of all the activities we have here, but we understand if life gets in the way sometimes. Just remember that we are praying for you even when you are not able to show up!

A PLEASURE OR A PAIN

"But Noah found favor with the LORD." - Genesis 6:8

Noah was a pleasure to the Lord. We are either a pleasure to the Lord, or a pain! What are the conditions of being a pleasure, of having such favored friendship with God?

First, we need to find out how we can bring pleasure to the Lord. Sometimes we really want to please the Lord, but we don't bother to find out how to do that. We're a lot more interested in how he can please us. The first thing that pleases God is our right behavior—our holy living when no one around us is behaving properly.

Noah was the only truly righteous man living on the earth at that time (Genesis 6:9), for Noah knew and understood God. It wasn't easy. It's hard to be the only one pleasing God when no one else is bothering. What was the state of Noah's society? The crime rate was rising—there was "violence and depravity everywhere" (Genesis 6:12). God saw that the world was rotten to the core. Noah was God's friend when others chose the friendship of the devil. But Noah tried always to conduct his affairs according to God's will and commands. (Genesis 6:9, 22).

Do we care more about pleasing God than pleasing others or ourselves? Do we see our world as "rotten to the core: as God sees it, and do we side with him? Then we can call ourselves God's friends! When God looks at us, are we a pleasure to him, or a pain?

RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Michael's Easy Peezy Cobbler

Ingredients:

cup of Bisquick
 cup of milk
 cup of sugar
 stick of butter

2 cans of pie filling

Put stick of butter into baking dish and put dish in oven. Preheat oven to 375° to let butter melt. While oven is preheating, mix together the milk, sugar, and Bisquick. Mix until all lumps are gone. Once butter is melted, take the dish out of the oven and pour the mixture into the baking dish. Do not mix the mixture and melted butter together. Open up the cans of pie filling and spoon the filling in the dish. Do not mix the filling, the mixture and the butter together. Bake until the crust is golden brown and the sides are bubbling (about 30 minutes depending on your oven). Enjoy with a nice scoop of vanilla ice cream!


