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

Mentoring today for a better tomorrow

Jesus based much of His approach to accomplishing His plan on His understanding of the Old Testament. He had a foundation of knowledge upon which to base His actions, and He executed brilliantly. To succeed, we must do the same thing.

Many young people come to our company who want to be in the television business. In television, writing is the foundation for everything. An axiom in our business says, "If you can't first put it down on paper, you can never put it up on the screen." Yet so many of the young people who come to us have not mastered even the fundamentals of grammar, the basics of the English language. They haven't prepared. They won't succeed.

Jesus powerfully taught us about preparation, both by His own perfect example and by His teaching. Many of the parables He used to explain His principles admonish us to be well prepared. For example, the parable of the foolish virgins, who were caught without oil in their lamps when the bridegroom came and thus missed the wedding, teaches us about adequate preparation. So also does the parable of the servants, who did not perform their assigned tasks and were not ready to meet their master upon his return. They thought the master would be away for a long time, so they wasted their time and received the master's wrath when he returned unexpectedly.

Whether you're laying the foundation for a career, launching a product, or making a presentation, there is no substitute for preparation. Give it the necessary time and attention. Jesus did. His amazing success is a testimony to its importance.

Wisdom of Larry the Cable Guy:

A day without sunshine is like night.

"So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom." (Psalm 90:12)

Another translation of the above verse goes like this: "Teach us to count our days so we can make our days count." As we began a new year, we had a sermon series called "Live The Life." During this series, we talked about living the life that glorifies God and this was a time to take an honest look at how our lives are lived for the Lord. Let's face it, we all fall short in living the way we should, so this was a series that we could all benefit from.

To help us get the most out of this sermon series, I decided to create a supplement and present it in this article. I'm sure most of you have heard of a bucket list before. This is a list of things you want to do before you "Kick the Bucket" and it usually contains a list of goals and dreams that you have always wanted to accomplish.

I want each of us to work on a "Spiritual Bucket List" so we can focus on what we want to do for the Lord. This is a list that will be personal, but I want us to find somebody to share the list with so we can pray for each other and check up on the list. When working on the items for the list, the first item on your list should be to get baptized if you have not been baptized yet. This is the single most important decision you will ever make in your life because you will become a child of God.

The rest of the items on your "Spiritual Bucket List" should contain tasks that will push you to become a deeper, more committed follower of Christ. There are some typical items that will most likely end up on most lists: Read the entire Bible, start a prayer journal, show random acts of kindness, memorize whole chapters of a Bible book, talk to your neighbor about Jesus, etc. All of those items should be on your list, but here are some items you may not think about:

1. <u>Forgive somebody who has hurt you deeply</u> - We have all been hurt by somebody, and the scars are deep. Ask God to help you forgive that person so you can move on with your life.

2. <u>Research a theological topic</u> - This item may sound scary to most people, but it can really help you strengthen your Biblical foundation if you take the time to work through a tough doctrine of the church. My office has plenty of books to help, and of course, I'm available too.

3. <u>Clean up the temple of the Lord</u> - The Apostle Paul says that your body is the temple of the Lord, so make some goals to clean it up. This is an area of weakness for me, so this is on my list.

4. <u>Invest in the community</u>: Visit a nursing home or volunteer in a school or a local ministry. If possible, attend a city council meeting so you can get to know the council members.

5. <u>Visit the Holy Land</u>: This item might take a few years to accomplish. There is something about walking where Jesus walked that is special, and one of my former professors provides trips on a regular basis when he teaches while guiding the group.

The main point for a spiritual bucket list is to organize your thoughts so you can focus on being the best Christian you can be. Now that the sermon series has ended, it's time to get to work!

IF YOU WANT TO WALK ON WATER... (Earl Winfrey)

Our 2018 theme "Get Out Of The Boat" was inspired by a book I studied several years earlier. In that book, I took a closer look at the story of Jesus walking on water, and for the first time, I saw Peter in a new light. We are quick to criticize Peter for his lack of faith, but at least he had enough faith to get out of the boat! That is my desire for our church. We may not have all the answers, but we can at least have enough faith to step out of the boat and let God lead us.

Below is a portion of my 2nd sermon in 2017:

Peter Got Out of the Boat (Read Matthew 14:22-33)

A. Jesus stayed behind to pray on the mountain - After the crowds left, Jesus needed some time alone in order to work through His grief. Remember that He was still needing to grieve over the loss of His cousin, John the Baptist. At this point, it is important to remember that even though Jesus was completely God, He chose to live life as a human and that meant that He needed to process His emotions the same way humans do. He was hurting from the loss of his cousin, and He needed to grieve in order to heal. I guess the lesson we can learn from this is that even though we may have to modify our plans in order to minister to people, we still need to make time for ourselves so we can be refreshed and become stronger.

B. After Jesus was finished, it was evening and the wind was against them - The Sea of Galilee is known for sudden storms that pop up after the sun goes down, and in this situation, the boat was too far from land to escape it. They had to ride out the storm on the sea, so I am sure that they were already anxious about the possibility of capsizing. To make matters worse, they thought they saw a ghost on the water. Of course, we know that it was Jesus walking towards them.

C. After finding out that Jesus was walking to them, Peter cried out to Jesus and got out of the boat to walk to Jesus (v.28-33) - I'm sure that we could criticize the fact that Peter took his eyes off Jesus and started to sink, but at least he had the courage to get out of the boat. The other Disciples were comfortable where they were but Peter wanted to get close to Jesus instead. Sometimes, you have to get out of the boat if you want to be like Jesus. As a church, we cannot allow ourselves to get so comfortable that we never challenge ourselves to become better. We need some "Get out of the boat" moments so we can continue to grow in our faith. If we never step out and take some risks, how will we ever know what God is capable of doing?

Our "Get out of the boat" moment as a church was in 2017, when we created a Fall Festival, and the parking lot was full! We challenged ourselves to put on the Fall Festival even though we did not have the resources of a bigger church. We gained exposure and got to talk to some of the people we would have never been able to meet if we did not step out of the boat. That was a great moment of faith for us, and I think it is time for us to look for more opportunities like that this year! Just like Peter, we need to have the faith to step out of the boat so we can be more like Jesus.

BACK PORCH CONVERSATIONS

"There's no such thing as Strangers, they are all just friends whose names I don't know yet."

The memorial service for my dad went great last month! It was good to stand in the church where he grew up and even sing songs that were led by the same choir leader who was working there 42 years ago when I was there as a young boy. We got to see some friends we haven't seen in a long time and meet some old friends of my dad from high school. One guy was telling me about being in ROTC with him and spending afternoons on the front porch shining boots. My dad had a reputation for being the best shoe shiner in the school. That makes sense because while I was growing up, my dad was shining his boots several times each week. I enjoyed being able to lead the service and having the grandkids participate by reading scripture and sharing thoughts about Paw-Paw. Michaela

played a special on the piano and my nephew Eric did a good job playing my father's violin. We also had a time for friends and family to say something about dad, and a couple of friends talked about how friendly he was. That was a good way to describe him.

My dad has never met a stranger. It didn't matter what was going on, he would be talking and having a good time with people he just met. I remember being in line for roller coasters at Six Flags and seeing him talk to those around us about anything and everything to make the time go by faster. He would share stories about when the park opened and his favorite story about putting me on the Scream Machine when I was 2 years old! My mom was a nervous wreck but he said that I loved it. I do not remember my first ride but I do know that the Scream Machine has always been my favorite so I have no doubt that it was my first big coaster.

Going out to eat with my dad was always an adventure. When we would go to the Golden Corral, he would talk to the waitress and forget that he was supposed to be eating his food. We would often remind him that there were other customers who needed the waitress and he should let her get back to work before she got in trouble. We were always there longer than usual because he would spend more time talking than eating. Of course, he would always leave a big tip so I am sure that the waitress was not that upset. Most of them enjoyed the conversations.

The world could use more people like my dad who are not afraid to talk to others and get to know them. Although I am an introvert, there are times when I enjoy a conversation or two as well so there could be some of my dad in me. He would often say that "There's no such thing as Strangers, they are all just friends whose names I don't know yet."

Invite your neighbor over for a meal.

Whether you model your cooking style after Martha Stewart or Betty Crocker, making a meal for your neighbor will be meaningful and hospitable. It doesn't have to be an extravagant feast; the simple act of inviting someone into your home is what matters most. Plus, some of the best conversations occur at the

This month's Church myth: "The thief on the cross is an example of a conversion for us"

The last words of Jesus is often the subject of interest among many Christians. One sentence is of particular importance for those who wish to argue against the need for baptism as part of salvation. Here is the passage:

Luke 23:39-43 (ESV), "(39) One of the criminals who were hanged railed at him, saying, 'Are you not the Christ? Save yourself and us!' (40) But the other rebuked him, saying, 'Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? (41) And we indeed justly, for we are receiving the due reward of our deeds; but this man has done nothing wrong.' (42) And he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.' (43) And he said to him, 'Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise.'"

The old "Thief on the cross" argument falls short of proving anything about salvation for several reasons, but I will try to keep this short and focus on a couple here. If you would like, I can give a full study on this passage if you want to sit down with me and discuss it.

Many people use the "Jesus" card and yes, that can be the end of the conversation for most since Jesus can do anything He wants so if He wanted to save the thief, that is up to Him. However, I believe that we have not successfully proven that this scene is about salvation in the sense that the thief was being converted on the cross. Can we prove that he was not already a follower of Jesus? The way he defends Jesus lets me know that he had some kind of belief and knowledge about who He is before being nailed to the cross. There is so much we do not know about this thief so how can we conclude that this was not a follower being brought back in after he had strayed?

Just for fun, let's assume that this scene is about salvation in the sense that Jesus converted the thief. How can we duplicate this for today's use? Where is the sinner's prayer in this scene that so many people try to insert when talking about salvation? Do we have any other scripture that points to this scene for the purpose of offering the plan of salvation? The Bible is silent when trying to find a conversion that involved something similar to this scene so I cannot use the thief on the cross for an example of somebody being saved without baptism. From the death of Jesus forward, the only conversions shared involved water baptism by immersion.

This myth is busted because even if this was a true conversion, we have no evidence of the early church using it as an example of how to be saved.

Step Out in Faith

"For the grace given to me, I tell everyone among you not to think of himself more highly than he should think. Instead, think sensibly, as God has distributed a measure of faith to each one." - Romans 12:3

Do we really do our best when we claim to do so? Should we assume everyone else is doing his or her best? We can easily overestimate our effort. We talk ourselves into believing we are more sacrificial than we are, as patient and forgiving as we can possibly be, that we are giving all we have and we simply cannot give one more ounce, second, or piece of ourselves.

Dumbing down our best is one way we think more highly of ourselves than we should. Other times, it's due to comparison. We claim "at least, I'm doing more than so-and-so." We place ourselves in the 10 percent-who-are-doing-90-percent-of-the-work category, but we don't have a good attitude about it. If we're willing to serve sacrificially and abundantly, shouldn't we do so with a posture of humility?

Thinking too highly of ourselves is a sign of pride, which can manifest as arrogance or self-loathing. Pride puts our own estimation of ourselves, good or bad, above the truth. We might believe we're doing our best, or stop short because we think we're less capable or poorly equipped. Pride is never our best.

God distributes a measure of faith to each of us. With that measure comes responsibility and capability. Only God knows exactly what our best is, and you can trust Him to equip, challenge, grow, and humble you when you step out in faith to serve Him.
