


After Easter is over, now what?



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What Kind of Church is First Christian Church?

First Christian Church is a non-denominational Elders-led Church located in Greenwood, SC. We are part of the movement to restore the simplicity of New Testament Christianity. Core Beliefs

A common misconception is that all churches believe and preach the same thing. Unfortunately that isn't the case. In a world that is greatly divided spiritually it is very important to know just exactly what a church believes and practices. We welcome the opportunity to sit with you and discuss these core beliefs in depth.

We believe...

- 1. That Jesus Christ is the only begotten Son of God who died for our sins and arose from the dead. 1 Corinthians 15:1-8
- 2. That the Bible is the inspired Word of God "a lamp unto our feet and a light unto our path". **2 Timothy 3:16; Psalm 119:105**
- 3. That every person has worth as a creation of God but "all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God" Romans 3:23
- 4. That forgiveness of sins and the promise of eternal life are available to those who trust and obey Christ as Savior and Lord. **John 3:16**
- 5. That we are saved by grace through faith in Christ. **Ephesians 2:8-9**
- 6. That the Church is the body of Christ on earth and exists to save the lost and edify the saved. **Ephesians 4:1-16**
- 7. That Jesus Christ will one day return as King of Kings and Lord of Lords. 1 Thes 4:13-18
- 8. That those accepting Christ must repent of sin, confess their faith and be baptized into Him. Romans 10:9, Acts 2:38

Now would be a good time to start praying for our church as planning will be happening for events to move us through the summer months while the kids are out of school.

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ESTABLISH AUTHORITY

INSIST ON ABSOLUTES

From pontificating pundits tweedy talk show academics who have never met a payroll, we hear that it is not politically correct to insist on absolutes. From truth to justice, all things are relative, they say. It's how you feel about it that counts. "Two diametrically opposing thoughts can both be true," they say, "Because there is no absolute truth."

Please don't try to run your business (Or the church) by this nonsense. Jesus insisted that some things are true and others false, that some things are right and others wrong, that some things are good and others evil. He even insisted that there is only one way to be reconciled to God, and that one way is through faith in Him. Talk about tough! Talk about dogmatic! Jesus never equivocated. A lack of absolutes can lead to all kinds of corporate problems, from petty thievery to major crime. It leads to shoddy products and shoddy practices in the marketplace. Teach the right way, insist on the right way, be an example of the right way. Follow Jesus' example.

"We should always have staples in the pantry"

One of the great benefits of being an adult volunteer in scouts is the continuing education that is provided for the leaders. Learning how to lead a group of teenagers in an age of rebellion mixed with the obsession with electronics and other indoor activities is a huge task for anybody, especially when nobody is getting paid to lead. I know that BSA has a damaged reputation and is not as highly regarded as it once was, but the training they offer is still top notch, and at the top of the list is Wood Badge training.

Wood Badge is their main course for training the leaders who want to make it to the next level. They spend a couple of weekends with other adult leaders taking a mix of outdoor skills and classes that are focused on helping them grow as leaders while having fun at the

same time. They break off into patrols and have a series of competitions and challenges to help them bond as a group and take turns leading. At the end of the course, there is a final project that has to be approved and then completed by a candidate before he/she is given the Wood Badge diploma and the recognition that comes with it. I have heard Wood Badge called the "PHD" of scouting, and I tend to agree with that statement.

When my dad took Wood Badge, he had a couple of sayings that were repeated throughout the course and brought home to us. This month, I will use one of his phrases: we should always have staples in the pantry. What are staples? Well, they are the little pieces of metal that are punched into paper in order to hold them together, but that's not important now. Ok, that was too hard to resist, so I had to go there! Staples are items like peanut butter and jelly which can be easily stored and available for a quick meal or snack when there is nothing else to eat. Staples will keep you from going hungry between trips to the grocery store, so we should always have them available. Along with PB and J, in our house, Ramen Noodles would be considered a staple.

In ministry, a staple could be a lesson or communion meditation that you have available just in case somebody ended up missing a Sunday or forgot that it was his/her time to teach. They are always available for those times when we are called upon to fill in. Some people have sermons as well just in case the preacher is sick and has to take a Sunday off. We should always have staples in our spiritual pantry so we can keep our people from going hungry.

Host a neighborhood block party



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This month's Church myth: "Money is the root of all evil"

Have you ever heard something that sounded so good that it must have come from the Bible? My favorite example of that is Benjamin Franklin's famous quote "God helps those who help themselves" which is nowhere to be found in the Bible. It may have been influenced by the Bible and it is a good quote, but it is not in the Bible. There are also times when Bible verses get twisted after so many misquotes and it causes people to think much differently about what they read. This month's church myth is such a verse. 1 Timothy 6:10 has been used and abused for so long that nobody seems to care about the fact that it does not say what people think it says.

For years, I have been taught that money is the root of all evil and I learned to use money as a way to pay the bills and nothing more. That was until I finally read the verse and studied it. Paul never said that money is the root of all evil. He said that the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Here is the verse with the previous verse to build context:

1 Timothy 6:9-10, "(9) But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. (10) For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs."

As you can see, verse 9 says that the people who desire to be rich fall into temptation and can end up destroying themselves. Verse 10 reinforces this idea by saying that the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is not saying that money is evil and it does not say that it is the root of all evil either. It says that the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil which is a general statement that loving money too much can be a bad thing. But is loving money really bad?


Looking at the original Greek word for the phrase "Love of money" can help us understand what kind of love this is. The phrase can be traced back to coveting, so this is a covetous type of love that can drive a person to commit illegal acts in order to gain it. That is certainly unhealthy, but it is not the money's fault. Money is only a resource that can be used for good or bad. It is up to each person to make it good or bad so the root of the evil is the person's desire, not the money. If a person desires money in an unhealthy way, it can bring evil consequences.

Along with that, verse 9 says that those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, but that does not mean the sin is unavoidable. It is possible to resist the temptation, but it requires the right heart for a person to become rich without evil consequences. And with the right heart, many great things can be done with money so this myth is busted.

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The Meaning Behind the Song: Oceans (Where Feet May Fail) by Hillsong United

One The song "Oceans (Where Feet May Fail)" by Hillsong United is a powerful worship anthem that has touched the hearts of millions across the globe. Released in 2013 as part of the album "Zion", the song has since become a staple in many church services and Christian gatherings. Its poignant lyrics and emotive melody have drawn listeners closer to their faith and inspired them to trust in God's sovereignty, even in the midst of life's uncertainties.

The song serves as a reminder that, just like Peter walking on water towards Jesus in the biblical account, we are called to step out in faith and trust God's guidance. The lyrics speak of going "where feet may fail" and being led "deeper than my feet could ever wander." RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Strawberry Cheesecake Dip

<u>Ingredients</u>: 8 oz cream cheese, softened;1 cup confectioner's sugar; ½ teaspoon vanilla extract; ½ cup heavy cream; ¼ cup strawberry jam; 1 package graham crackers;

Instructions:

- 1. In a bowl, add softened cream cheese, confectioner's sugar, and vanilla extract. Using a hand mixer or stand mixer, mix until fully combined and incorporated. Set it aside.
- 2. In a separate bowl, add heavy cream. Using a hand mixer or stand mixer with a whisk attachment, whip for about 2-3 minutes to medium peaks.
- 3, Gently fold whipped cream into cream cheese mixture until fully incorporated. Spread cheesecake dip into a wide, shallow bowl and top with strawberry jam. Use a knife to swirl jam into dip.

Serve immediately with graham crackers, or store in the refrigerator until ready to serve.

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Stand by Your God

"I will call on him as long as I live." Psalm 116:2b

Consider the fruit that comes from spending time with your heavenly Father. In Galatians 5, Paul writes that "the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control" (vs 22/23). Think about each item on that list. Which of us doesn't need a touch of God's love, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, and self-control in our life? Those are things—as well as guidance, wisdom, hope and a deeper knowledge of Him—that He wants to give us as His children.

"But," you say, "who has time? My 'To Do' list is always longer than my day. I run from the time the alarm goes off in the morning until I fall into bed at night. How can I possibly find time to do one more thing? When could I find even a few minutes to read the Bible or pray?" I answer your question with a question: Are you doing what's important in your day—or only what is urgent?

God greatly desires to spend time alone with you. After all, you are His child (John 1:12, Galatians 3:26). He created you; He loves you, and He gave His only Son for your salvation. Your heavenly Father wants to know you, and He wants you to know Him. The Creator of the universe wants to meet with you alone daily. How can you say no to such an opportunity?

So, make it your priority to spend time with God daily. There's not a single right time or one correct place. The only requirement for a right time with God is your willing heart. Your meeting time with God will vary according to the season of your life and the schedules you are juggling. Jesus often slipped away to be alone in prayer (Luke 5:16), but even His prayer time varied. He prayed in the morning and late at night, on a hill and in the upper room (Mk 1:35; Lk 22:41-45; Mt 14:23; Jn 17).

The times and places where we meet God will vary, but the fact that we meet alone with God each day should be a constant in our life. After all, God has made it clear that He is interested in us who are His children (1 Peter 5:7).

What should you do in your time alone with God? After you've read and meditated on God's Word for a while, spend some time with Him in prayer. Talk to Him as you would to your earthly parent or a special friend who loves you, desires the best for you, and wants to help you in every way possible.

Time with your heavenly Father is never wasted. If you spend time alone with God in the morning, you'll start your day refreshed and ready for whatever comes your way. If you spend time alone with Him in the evening, you'll go to sleep relaxed, resting in His care and ready for a new day to serve Him.

Remember, too, that you can talk to Him anytime, anywhere—in school, at work, on the freeway, at home—about anything. You don't have to make an appointment to ask Him for something you need or to thank Him for something you have received from Him. God is interested in everything that happens to you.


